Unfortunately, the storm was headed for Lubbock as well so we drove right after Shabbat to San Antonio. We spent a lovely three unplanned days there exploring the Alamo, Riverwalk, New Children's Museum and various activities like the Mirror Maze. After San Antonio we traveled to Carlsbad, New Mexico to explore the largest caverns in the Western Hemisphere. They are beautiful, impressive and truly large enough to fit an underground city. When I last wrote we had spent five wonderful days in Scottsdale. Our next stop was San Diego and we chose to drive there through Palm Springs. We had a great time taking the aerial tram from 55 and sunny at the bottom to 30 and snowy at the top. We did a little sledding, had some hot chocolate and enjoyed our ride down.

To celebrate Liana's birthday we went to Sea World San Diego where she was able to feed, touch and help "train" a dolphin. It was truly a highlight. We enjoyed home hospitality for dinner at the parents of a Beth El friend (thanks Danielle!) and of course really enjoyed our experience at the San Diego zoo. On our way to LA we surprised Ari with a special treat - a surfing lesson on Huntington Beach! While the girls and I enjoyed swimming and playing in the sand Ari and Erica did a great job riding the waves. Also on the way to LA we celebrated Noa and Miri's birthdays at Disneyland. Going in January meant short lines and fun was had by all. Ari and I particularly liked the new Star Wars rides.

In LA we stayed with close friends and had a wonderful Shabbat with them. We also enjoyed the hospitality of Rabbi Camras, a friend and colleague, who is the spiritual leader of Congregation Shomrei Torah. It was a lovely shul experience complete with the celebration of a bat mitzvah and a guest speaker. We also visited American Jewish University's Skirball museum and had a great experience in their interactive Noah's Ark exhibit. There was also a wonderful exhibit about how individuals and communities can make a difference in the world. I was impressed and glad my kids experienced that exhibit. Before we left we (of course) had to go to Hollywood! We did it Schwab style and hiked to the Hollywood sign which was fun. Then we drove Hollywood Boulevard past the stars and Chinese Theatre. The highlight was when "Spider-Man" gave Liana a balloon animal through our car window while we were at a light.

Next we headed to Edwards Air Force base where my cousin is a test pilot. It was great to see him, his wife and their dog, all of whom our children adore. We received a first class insider's tour, viewing many different aircraft up close and getting a peek inside test pilot school. It is a huge base which also houses NASA operations as well as certain private contractors such as Lockheed and the like.

After a short stopover at M&M world on the Vegas strip and a drive-by of Lake Mead and the Hoover dam, we arrived at the snowy peak of the Grand Canyon. We stayed on site at their RV park and after a restful night were dazzled by the majestic views from the rim in the morning. During the afternoon we hiked into the canyon on the bright angel trail, braving the snowy and icy conditions. I was very proud of the kids who were great hikers.

On our way from the Grand Canyon to Albuquerque/Santa Fe we made two wonderful stops. First was Bearizona. A relatively new wildlife park it provided unbelievably close encounters with Wolves, bears, bison and mountain goats. None of us had ever been within an arms reach of some of these types of animals without a fence or wall separating us. It was quite an experience. Next we stopped at Meteor Crater, supposedly the most well preserved meteor crater in the world. There was a movie, Museum and of course the crater - all of which were interesting.

The next morning we enjoyed the hot air balloon museum in Albuquerque on our way to Santa Fe. The kids particularly enjoyed a balloon simulator where they could "pilot" their own balloon. The experience inspired us to make arrangements for a real balloon ride that Sunday - we were all excited.

That Shabbat we enjoyed the wonderful hospitality of the Santa Fe Jewish community. Welcomed by both the Reform and Orthodox rabbis (no Conservative shul) due to parking availability we stayed across the street from one of the lovely members of one of the Orthodox shuls. We had a hamish Shabbat experience at what my kids called the "small shul" as it consisted of three rooms in a small business park. However davening was nice, kiddish was home cooked by members and we met some lovely people. That afternoon we visited the home of Beth El members Ivy Stern and Jeff Zilka who also gave us a great walking tour of downtown Santa Fe. After joining a couple of Santa Fe families for havdalah we went to sleep early in preparation for our early morning balloon ride. Let's just say there was nothing not to love about the ride. The view was magnificent, the ride relaxing and exhilarating and our pilot was great. We next hiked the mountains in Bandolier National park climbing ladders to visit ancient pueblos, experiencing the beautiful forest and meeting some elk up close.

The next day we tackled the slopes of Santa Fe, well at least Ari and Liana did! Thanks to a state-wide program subsidizing young skiers they got lessons and lift tickets for the day at a great price while the rest of us enjoyed a relaxing day in the lodge. The instructors said they were great and both had a fantastic time. After dinner with a wonderful couple we met over Shabbat in Santa Fe we got ready to say goodbye to that fun city.

We woke up to snow and headed toward Taos - a mountain town east of Santa Fe. After enjoying the beautiful drive we did a great hike into the canyon where the Rio Grande flowed. There was snow and ice on the path and the river was cold but by a miracle of nature right on its banks were hot spring pools that were 100 degrees. We all enjoyed a fun swim and dip in the springs while watching the Rio Grande roar by.

Finally it was time to start heading home. After a long night drive we arrived in Liberal Kansas, home to Dorothy and the Land of Oz. The kids enjoyed their virtual Oz experience and we all concluded that there is no place like home! After a great second visit with my brother and his wife in Lawrence we set out for our last stop - the Endangered Wolf Center outside of St. Louis.
