The animals are putting on a Purim play. Can Cluck find the courage of Queen Esther to rescue Quack and save the show?

***Problems in Purimville* by Karen Fisman (J240.5)**

Jacob and Sarah must draw on their wits and courage as they try to solve the problems in Purimville.

***NEW! Chelm for the Holidays* by Valerie Frankel (J240)**

Includes "The Queen Esther Mix-Up" and other silly holiday stories set in the tiny Jewish village of Chelm.

***Cakes & Miracles* by Barbara Goldin (E240.5)**

Young, blind Hershel finds that he has special gifts he can use to help his mother during Purim.

The Better-Than-Best Purim

by Naomi Howland (E240.5)

An old woman makes *hamantaschen* cookies, with no assistance from her lazy pets who are secretly planning a surprise.

Sam & Charlie (and Sam too!)

by Leslie Kimmelman (JF)

Sometimes even the best of friends can have their disagreements like who gets the last *hamantaschen* in "Story Two: Sharing," one of the stories in this book.

***It's Purim Time!* by Latifa Berry Kropf (E240.5)**

Photographs and easy-to-read text portray children in a Jewish preschool celebrating Purim.

***The Purim Superhero* by Elisabeth Kushner (E240.5)**

Nate wants to dress as an alien for Purim but his friend wants him to wear a superhero costume, so Nate seeks guidance from his Daddy and Abba, who advise that being yourself makes you stronger.

***Talia and the Haman-Tushies* by Linda Marshall (E240.5)**

Talia is confused when she thinks the *hamantaschen* cookies she and Grandma are baking for Purim are called Haman-tushies.

Not for All the Hamantaschen in Town

by Laura Aron Milhander (E240.5)

The three little pigs worry that the Purim festivities will be spoiled by the big bad wolf.

***Purim is Coming!* by Tracy Newman (E240.5)**

In this board book, a family and their dog get ready for Purim by baking *hamantaschen*, making costumes, and reading the megillah.

***Sammy Spider's 1st Purim* by Sylvia Rouss (E240.5)**

A young spider wants to join in as Josh and his mother bake *hamantaschen*, make a costume, and spin the *grogger* for Purim.

***NEW! A Queen in Jerusalem* by Tami Shem-Tov (E240.5)**

Upset with her mother for not making her a Queen Esther costume for Purim, Malka goes out and meets Boris, who, with students at Jerusalem's Bezalel art school, helps her out.

***Raisel's Riddle* by Erica Silverman (E240.5)**

A Jewish version of the Cinderella story, in which a poor but educated young woman captivates her "Prince Charming," a rabbi's son, at a Purim ball.

***The Purim Surprise* by Lesley Simpson (E240.5)**

Having moved to a new city just before Purim, Naomi reluctantly agrees to help deliver *shalach manot*, while worrying that her mother has forgotten her seventh birthday.

NEW! *Esther's Gragger* by Martha Seif Simpson (E240.5)

A shopkeeper who grumbles about the noise of Purim *graggers* uses one to chase away a mean boy who tries to steal the special *gragger* Ben bought for his sister.

***Barnyard Purim* by Kelly Terwilliger (E240.5)**

Farmer Max's animals decide to put on a Purim play, directed by Chicken.

***Goldie's Purim* by Jane Breskin Zalben (E240.5)**

Goldie overcomes her stage fright to play Queen Esther in the synagogue's celebration of Purim. See also *Beni's Family Cookbook for the Jewish Holidays* for Goldie's *hamantaschen* recipe and other Purim treats (J741).

***It's Party Time!* by Jonny Zucker (E240.5)**

Here is a simple introduction to Purim that follows a family as they wear costumes, go to synagogue, and make lots of noise!

An award-winning translation brings new immediacy to these beloved books of the Bible.

NEW! *The Esther Scroll* by Seymour Epstein (224)

An exceptional work of meticulous reading and bold interpretation of The Book of Esther.

***Haman and the Jews: A Portrait from Rabbinic Literature* by Elaine Rose Glickman (220.1)**

A scholarly, yet accessible, study of Haman provides insight into the nature of hatred and evil, as well as reconciliation and triumph. Also discusses what rabbinic literature can teach us about the Hamans of our time.

***The Gilded Chamber* by Rebecca Kohn (F)**

This sweeping, meticulously researched novel restores Esther to her full, complex humanity while reanimating the glittering Persian empire.

***Game of Queens: A Novel of Vashti & Esther* by India Edghill (F)**

A lavish reimagining of the stories of two biblical queens recounts how Vashti lost her crown by defying the king before the Esther risked her life to advocate for her people.

***Queen of Secrets* by Jenny Meyerhoff (TF)**

Fifteen-year-old Essie Green, an orphan who has been raised by her secular Jewish grandparents in Michigan, experiences conflicting loyalties and confusing emotions in this modern-day twist on the Queen Esther story.

***After the Apple* by Naomi Rosenblatt (305)**

Blending history, psychology, and storytelling, this collection of stories of women in the Bible includes Esther.

***Good for the Jews* by Debra Spark (F)**

This novel holds a modern mirror to the book of Esther with a cast of characters from present day Wisconsin who identify with Jewish culture rather than religion.

by Paul Steinberg (240)

Bursting with primary sources, poems, prayers, rituals, and stories, this guide will help you create a holiday experience rich in meaning and spirit.

***The Murmuring Deep* by Avivah Zornberg (220.1)**

With concepts drawn from psychoanalytic thinkers, provides a new understanding of the desires and motivations of the men and women of the Bible, including Queen Esther.
