What motivates Pharaoh to enslave the Israelites?

>> What is the root concern Pharaoh expresses to the Egyptians?

The Egyptians ruthlessly imposed upon the Israelites the various labors that they made them perform. Ruthlessly they made life bitter for them with harsh labor at mortar and bricks and with all sorts of tasks in the field.

>> The verses say 'the Egyptians' enslaved the Israelites, not an individual Pharaoh. What responsibility did ordinary Egyptians have in the Israelite oppression?




