Sameach Uvadeach: Bringing Purim Joy to Everyone

For most Jews Purim is likely the most carefree and merry of all of the Jewish holidays. Masks, costumes, sweets, and singing characterize our celebration on this happy day. It is not a yuntif, and our religious services take on a light, festive and raucous character that is unlike any other service during the year.

As most of you know, Purim is a celebration of the victory of Esther, Mordechai and the Jewish population of Shushan over Haman, the evil advisor of King Ahashverosh who plotted to destroy us. Therefore, on the holiday of Purim we read this story from

of Jewish knowledge.

Megillat Esther (the Scroll of Esther), both in the evening and again in the morning. In the spirit of the distinctiveness of Purim, it is not read in the typical style of a sacred text but rather with a special trope (melody) and with plenty of interruptions. Instead of simply listening quietly to the reading, we pay careful attention to the words so that when we hear "Haman" read aloud, we can all spin our noisy graggers to drown out any mention of his name. At those moments the synagogue is transformed from a quiet sanctuary to a spirited gathering place, allowing each member to participate in the holiday regardless of one's individual level

Further, a slightly lesser known fact is that a tradition of comedy, satire and parody has long been associated with Purim. Yiddish theater turned Purim into prime time for satirical entertainment and even the traditional yeshivas had Purim spiels and other satirical events to capture the spirit of the holiday. During those spiels, comedic impersonations of even the heads of the yeshiva were

common. It was a time when formal convention was temporarily dismissed and joy ruled the day.

Following that spirit, we at NSS Beth El will be holding joyous Purim services as well. At 7pm on Wednesday, March 16th we will have Maariv and a fun and spirited megillah reading for all.

> Everyone is encouraged to join the clergy and Beth El staff and come in costume. Though COVID will prevent us from sharing a sit-down meal (seudah) together, after the service you are invited to a comedic screening introducing Beth El's very own streaming service, Beth El Plus! It will be sure to make you laugh

Purim spirit. Of course, both services and the video sketches will be available on livestream for those who are not able to attend in person.

Finally, never forget that on Purim we must also ensure that the larger community around us is able to be as joyous as we are. Thus, it is customary to do two important things. One, on Purim we are to send mishloach manot, a gift of foods to several other community members. The idea is that by giving gifts you will include others in the joy of the day and bring them your festive spirit. Second, and even more important, is to give gifts to those in need. At Beth El we take a collection at both the evening and morning Megillah readings. Plus many wonderful Jewish organizations that support those in need have programs for matanot laevyonim. Please give generously when you attend our services or find a way to make a donation to the poor that day.

Have a joyous Purim and hope you can join the Beth El community celebration!

Kindness and Community

The end of my favorite quote (from Pirkei Avot 1:6) is a bit surprising. "Select for yourself a master-teacher, cultivate a partner in study, and when you assess people, tip the balance in their favor." At first glance, it doesn't seem to directly connect to the first two pieces of the message. Rabbi Reuven Hammer shares that the progression is from only benefit to you, benefit to your close friend, and finally extending benefit to the larger community.

5782 has been a year of re-engaging with community, and after a year with so much isolation, it is no easy thing. Teachers are utilizing every tool in their toolkit to maintain calm and focus in a classroom. Students who have not had to negotiate group dynamics work hard to figure out how to talk to their classmates and manage their changing friendships. Families

who don't agree about health protocols bicker and offend each other.

We all are exhausted after the ongoing pandemic and the challenges that aren't directly related to it. This meaningful message from our ancestors tells us- give people the benefit of the doubt. Assume that the administration is trying hard to meet the needs of all its constituents. Assume that the other parent is trying their best to raise a nice kid who has friends. Assume that repair person who came to your house might have had three angry clients before you and is just trying to make it successfully through the day. Start your interaction with someone assuming the best about them-tipping the balance in their favor right from the start.

It's not easy to assume the best, or constantly offer the best possible

explanation for challenging behavior. Being in community is challenging, especially when your community doesn't seem to see eye-to-eye with you on how to be! We are exhorted elsewhere in the Sayings of Our Ancestors by the great sage Hillel (Pirkei Avot 2:4) "not to withdraw from the community." Though it presents us with periodic challenges, the value of being in community far outweighs any drawbacks. It is the community that will support you in good times and bad ones. The power of community will change and strengthen how we interact with the world. Through community, our children will find partners and friends and colleagues. Start with kindness, continue in kindness, assume a kind intention, and offer a kind resolution. We will reap the benefits of teachers, partners, and a community that grows ever more beautiful each day.

- The Haggadah concludes with a hopeful aspiration for the coming year. What's your hope for your life and for our collective future this year?

This Passover, take time to celebrate community, family, friends and, of course, freedom.



We reviewed over 150 fiction, nonfiction and poetry books published in 2021. This year's winner is Jane Yolen for her poetry collection Kaddish: Before the Holocaust and After. Dubbed "The Hans Christian Anderson of Children's Literature," Yolen, who has published over 400 books for readers of all ages, also received the Sydney Taylor Bodyof-Work Award from the Association of Jewish Libraries in recognition of her substantial contribution to Jewish children's literature. Dara Horn's **People Love Dead Jews: Reports** from a Haunted Present earned a Sophie Brody Honor Award as well as a National Jewish Book Award and was recognized as an American Library AsSophie Brody Honor winners are: **Tunnels**, a graphic novel by **Rutu**

Last summer, a group congregants and staff committed to making Torah reading at NSS Beth El accessible, fun and easy (relatively speaking, because reading Torah is a hard-won skill).

"Let's do something no shul has ever done before," proposed Michael Millenson, the new chair of the synagogue's venerable Baal Korei Institute, whose name was ultimately changed to the welcoming "Team Torah." He went on, "Let's see if we can engage 100 members of the synagogue to read Torah in the Jewish year 5782 (which began Rosh Hashanah). Do you think it's possible, given the realities of the pandemic?"

I had no doubt it would come to pass. I knew we had the people, the committee had the drive and I was committed, as Ritual Director, to make it happen—somehow.

"We should do something fun for each Torah reader," someone

on the committee suggested during a very long meeting. We discussed Torah Troll dolls, and a whole host of other swag, when someone (I think half-jokingly) proposed "cookies."

And so it was: a plan was hatched (or rather mixed and baked) to reward each Torah reader with an iced sugar cookie decorated with the yet-to-be designed Team Torah logo. Said logo was created, and we created a poster whereupon we would place a logo-sticker with each person's name on it. It seemed ambitious at the time, and in the back of our heads we hoped we could cajole or coerce enough people to read that we would, sometime by next Rosh Hashanah reach our #100.

With delighted smiles, Hazzan
Sandler handed off the cookie after the
reader finished, and one of the Rabbis
acknowledged the achievement. More
cookies, more smiles (and, dare I say,
more mirth) and we were in reach
of the goal long before next Rosh
Hashanah.

It seemed everyone wanted to get in on the cookie thing.

"How do I get a cookie?" "What do I have to do?" Take a class, sign up for a TorahReaders.net account, learn and do! Readers from teens to octogenearians heard the call of the cookie and many "cookie-paloozas" (Shabbatot when we have a particularly large number of new-for-5782 readers) later, we are there. We are at #100 and heading for 120 and more!

It's not too late to become a part of the Team Torah more-than-100-Reader Challenge. "Everyone" can be part of it if you are at least bar/bat mitzvah age.

Participation will be easy. If you need a refresher course, a recording, a helping hand – we're here, online and in person. If you'd like to learn to read – we'll help.

This year, Chantal, along with the help of the children in our Steinberg Pre-School reimagined its aesthetic and blanketed it in Jersualem stone.


Each stone, carefully placed, joins the one next to it to bring the beautiful feeling of Jerusalem right here to Highland Park.

The Youth Community at NSSBE has been a pillar of this synagogue for many years. We have seen individuals go on to accomplish incredible things, we have seen them give back to Beth El in many ways, and have seen their children (and children's children) be integral members of our community as well.

Since 1962, teens have been recognized and honored on our Youth Leadership Award board. Show Up, You Will be Glad You Did!

As a member of the Ritual Committee, I was asked to write a contribution for this quarterly newsletter. As I think about our ritual practices, I begin to think about why ritual is important to me. I didn't grow up in a particularly ritually observant family, nor did I always feel the need to be observant.

For those who don't know, my father passed away in December of 2016. At that time, I came to an evening minyan and was admittedly intimidated. I struggled to keep up; I was lost to say the least. Then something happened. I kept showing up and I not only became more familiar with the service, but I started becoming friendly with the "minyan regulars."



We would talk about anything: sports, news of the day, the weather or work. There were others who were regulars and there were others also saying *kaddish*. The connections I made while observing this ritual cross all populations in

our congregation.

In time, I started to feel confident in the minyan service; that translated to attending more minyan services and more of the Shabbat morning service, and more of the Yom Tov services so much that I am now someone who has a "regular seat" in the back row of the sanctuary.

Our rituals, whether they be congre-

gational or individual at home, are designed to provide a rhythm to our lives. There is an intentional pause to the bustle of the week in our Shabbat. Most of our holidays embrace appreciation for something that is easily overlooked by the business of our lives. Kashrut even requires a pause to think about what we are eating or not eating, and why.

I am on my own Jewish journey based on ritual observance that has been on a sharp increase since my father's passing; the more I involve myself with ritual, the more I find its importance. If you are someone who does not see themselves as ritually observant, my recommendation to you is to "show up" to services and keep showing up. We are happy to help you on your journey and welcome you.

Sefirat HaOmer - The Counting of the Omer

By the time you're reading this, we'll be looking forward to Purim, Passover, Yom Ha'atzma'ut and shortly thereafter, Shavuot. So many wonderful holidays I could write about.

Of course as a musician, theater person, and so-called funny guy, I love Purim. However, the calendar offers another, often overlooked observance that has become one of my favorites - Sefirat HaOmer - the Counting of the Omer.

From the second night of Passover we count up 7 complete weeks, equaling 49 days and on the 50th day, we celebrate Shavuot, recounting the revelation at Mount Sinai. While the Omer has agricultural origins, collecting a sheaf of wheat each day between the spring harvest and the first fruits of summer, it has since taken on a mystical significance that I've found especially meaningful.

If you want a more in-depth introduction to Kabbalah and the Omer, consider registering



for my spring Continuing Education class,

"Counting The Omer: A Mystical Journey from Liberation to Revelation," (Mondays, March 28-May 23 at 8:00 pm) but for now all you need to know is that each of these 7 weeks corresponds to one of the seven lower sefirot of the Tree of Life.

Sefirot are like attributes or characteristics of how G-d interacts with creation, and also characteristics we aspire to cultivate in ourselves. They are: **Chesed** (Loving-kindness), **Gevurah** (Strength or discipline), **Tiferet** (Balance), **Netzah** (Endurance), **Hod** (Gratitude), **Yesod**

(Connection), and **Malchut** (Leadership). Every year when the Omer comes, many Jews spend a week ruminating on each of these themes, in that order. And within each week, are seven days to consider how each of the 7 themes are related to the other 6.

What does it mean to have enduring kindness? How can we strive to have more balance in our leadership? How do we show gratitude to those we connect with?

Every spring, after celebrating the Exodus from Egypt during Passover, we have the chance to take our renewed sense of freedom and begin the process of self-reflection and self-refinement that will open us up to deeper revelation when Shavuot comes. Some of these attributes come naturally to us while others are a real struggle to hold on to. However, as we are made in the Image of G-d, we contain the capacity to embody each one. You can count on that!

Forbidden Foods

The following foods are forbidden to Ashkenazic Jews during Pesach: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits and crackers; cereals, coffee substitutes derived from cereals; wheat, barley, oats, rice, dry peas, dry beans, and all liquids which contain ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. (Sephardic Jews have some different practices.)

Permitted Foods

Requiring no kosher l'Pesach label, the following foods are permitted in unopened packages or containers: natural coffee, sugar, tea, salt, pepper, and fresh vegetables (except peas and beans, although string beans are permitted on Pesach).

The following foods are permitted if certified for Pesach use by Rabbinical authority (have a kosher l'Pesach label): matzah, matzah flour, Passover noodles, candies,

cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, milk, butter, jams, cheese, jellies, relishes, dried fruits and vegetables, salad oils, vegetable gelatin, shortening, vinegar. Wines and liquors are permitted if certified by a Rabbinical authority as fit for Pesach use.

Dishes and Utensils

Only dishes and utensils specially reserved for Pesach should be used with the following exceptions: silverware made entirely of metal if used during the year may be used on Pesach if thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. Metal pots and pans used for cooking purposes only (but not for baking), if made wholly of metal, though used during the year, may be used on Pesach. They must first be thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. The utensils should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between their cleaning and immersion in boiling water.

Utensils used for baking during the year cannot be used for Passover. Earthenware, enamelware and porcelain utensils used during the year may not be used. Fine translucent chinaware if not used for a year is permitted if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

Authorities disagree as to the method of kashering drinking glasses. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach or putting them through a dishwasher. A dishwashing machine may be used for Passover after a thorough scouring, non-use for 24 hours and running a complete cycle. Authorities disagree whether a new tray is necessary.

The stove is prepared by a thorough scrubbing and cleansing of all parts, then turning on the ovens and all burners full-flame

for one half hour. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned, then put through the self-cleaning cycle.

Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens. Microwave ovens should be cleaned, and then a cup of water placed inside. The oven should be turned on until the water disappears.

A microwave that has a browning element cannot be kashered. In all the above cases the appliance cannot be used for 24 hours prior to kashering.

If the parts of electrical appliances that come into contact with Hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way. If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered.

Non-Passover dishes, pots and Hametz whose ownership has been transferred should be separated, locked up or covered and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Bedikat Hametz (The Search For and Burning of Leaven)

On the evening of Thursday, April 14th, the Search for Leaven, Bedikat Hametz, is conducted. This is a ritual that symbolizes the final cleaning of the house of all Hametz. It is customary to place pieces of bread in various rooms around the house before the search begins - remember how many pieces there are and where they are hidden! The search is conducted with a candle for light and a feather and wooden spoon to collect the Hametz. The Hametz, feather and wooden spoon should be put in a bag and set aside to be burnt in the morning.

In the morning - this year on Friday, March 26 - after eating our last meal of Hametz, add any remains from breakfast to the bag of Hametz from the previous night, and burn them outside the home. This is the final act of removal of Hametz from our homes. Hametz should be burned by 1:32



am. The appropriate prayers for the search for and destruction of Chametz are found at the beginning of every Haggadah.

Mechirat Hametz (Sale of Hametz)

In addition to the thorough cleaning of the house before Pesach, we are commanded to completely free ourselves of leavened products. Anything made from wheat, barley, oats, rye or spelt, which had a chance to leaven (rise or ferment), must be destroyed. Today a simple but meaningful tradition is followed:

- Each Jewish home must be cleaned before Pesach.
- The Rabbi contractually arranges for the sale of the Hametz to a non-Jew so that it will, technically, be out of Jewish possession during Pesach.

• At the end of Pesach, everything in your stored-up area will be repurchased for vour immediate use.

Maot Chitim (Portions of

Wheat) It is traditional for Jews who have been blessed by the Almighty to make sure that their less fortunate brethren have all that is necessary to celebrate a joyous Pesach. Special funds for this purpose, known as Maot Chitim, are collected in synagogues throughout the world. Beth El participates in this activity. If you would like to make a contribution to the Maot Chitim fund, please mail it directly to the synagogue, or bring it in personally, and earmark it accordingly. These funds will be distributed to the

Greater Chicago Maot Chitim and other institutions that provide Pesach food to the less fortunate.

Siyyum Bechorim (Fast of the Firstborn)

The ceremony of Siyyum Bechorim will take place following the morning minyan on Friday, April 15th at 7:00 am. It is customary for the first-born male to fast on the day preceding Passover. In place of the fast, however, tradition developed the practice of concluding a portion of study of a Rabbinic text after which celebration and feasting takes place. The Siyyum Bechorim ceremony is the means of obviating the need for a fast. We encourage all first-born males to attend.

Our Opportunity to Give Back and Welcome Refugees to Our Community

Many of us know personally, through our family histories, what it is like to be refugees in need of assistance in a new homeland. JCFS Chicago's HIAS Immigration & Citizenship program will be supporting over 100 people from

around the world as
they rebuild their lives
in the Chicagoland
area, beginning with 50
people from Afghanistan
in January and early
February. The first family
from Afghanistan arrived
in the Chicago area in
early January. A group
of congregants from Am
Yisrael in Northfield is
working with HIAS to

ensure the family's needs are met, that their integration into our community goes smoothly, and that they are on their way to self-sufficiency.

When refugees first arrive at their new homes, they rarely have anything more

than a single suitcase. They are usually overwhelmed by a new language, new culture, and new environment. Co-sponsorship is an opportunity for our community to work with HIAS to support these families during the first three months in their new homes and communities. Together, we can help them understand and adjust to all that is around them and provide critical financial and social-emotional support.

I am hoping several of you will consider joining together to co-sponsor a refugee family. Here is what's involved.

Each co-sponsor group is asked to complete these steps:

- Raise a minimum of \$10,000 for HIAS Immigration & Citizenship's Welcome Campaign.
- 2. Set up their assigned family's apartment prior to arrival.
- 3. Support their assigned family for a minimum of 3 months post-arrival.

This includes:

- Providing or purchasing furniture and household goods and setting up the family's apartment before their arrival
- Welcoming the family at the airport upon arrival.
- Preparing the family's first meal and stocking their pantry with culturally appropriate foods (under the supervision of HIAS).
- Assigning 3-4 volunteer tutors to work with the family on English language learning and/or homework assistance for school-aged children.
- Assigning 3-4 volunteer mentors to work with the family. Mentors may provide transportation to medical and other appointments, help the family locate and access community resources, and support the family with general acclimation and problem solving.

Unsung Heroes "Stalking" a Culinary Giant

Celery is so much more than crudites, dieter's munchies and a garnish in a Bloody Mary. Celery is often relegated to barely a mention in so many recipes. And yet, handled properly, celery can be the STAR!

Celery is used in many cuisines around the globe, and the entire plant is edible. The stalks can be used as an aromatic in soups, stocks and stews. The leaves are delicately flavored and can be used as a garnish. The French love celery so much it is part of the "holy trinity" along with carrots and onions as the base for many dishes.

In north America, we eat a variety of celery called Pascal stalk celery. In Europe, celeriac or celery root is used. Celeriac has a LOUD celery flavor, while the stalks we eat in the states have a quiet flavor.

Love it or hate it, celery is often an afterthought. But cooked and carefully paired with other flavors, celery becomes the star that it is and shines in many dishes including this recipe for Passover or all year round.

Creamy Celery Soup

A gorgeous Emerald Green soup that screams SPRING is quick to prepare, easy to find ingredients and perfect for a Passover meal or anytime.

Serves 6+
1/3 cup Extra Virgin
Olive Oil
1 large head Celery,
thinly sliced
(leaves reserved)
Sea Salt and
freshly cracked
Black Pepper
2 large Leeks,
white and light
green parts only,
thinly sliced

1 large Celeriac root, peeled and diced 4 large Garlic Cloves, minced 3 medium Yukon Gold Potatoes, peeled and sliced ½ cup dry white wine 6 cups Chicken or Vegetable Stock (homemade is best) 2 cups fresh Baby Spinach ½ cup flat leaf Parsley leaves Suggested Garnishes: celery leaves, garlicky-lemon oil, chopped almonds, snipped chives

1. Heat a large saucepan or stock pot, lightly coated with evoo, over medium


heat. Add celery, leeks and celeriac and cook, stirring occasionally until veggies are wilted and very fragrant (about 20 minutes). Be sure to season with salt and pepper.

2. Add garlic, potatoes and wine and continue cooking until most of the wine has evaporated. Add stock and reduce heat to a simmer. Continue cooking until potatoes and celeriac are

very soft (about 30 minutes). Turn off heat and allow to cool for 30 minutes before pureeing.

3. Add spinach and parsley leaves and puree until creamy.

4. Adjust seasoning with salt and pepper and garnish with reserved celery leaves, snipped chives and drizzle with good quality extra virgin olive oil.






