8. Consider how to add your light. Hanukkah is about driving out the darkness by adding light. It's why we light the candles at night and not during the day; and why the holiday falls in the winter and

not in the summer. What light can you add to the world to drive away some darkness?

I also want to give you a preview of a few of the major items we will focus on over the next few months.

As you'll recall, we spent a good deal of time talking to you about our financial outlook during our Town Hall Meetings and subsequent, related communications. We talked about our contingency planning process and the various scenarios we were preparing for.

I am pleased to tell you that some key measures of our financial health are well within our contingency budget parameters.

Our membership dues are fine, and our

Chesed and Kol Nidre Appeal donations are also well within the range we hoped for.

I don't want to mislead anyone. We are not at pre-pandemic levels, but we are within our contingency guidelines.

Let me stop right here and recognize you, our Members, for your amazing generosity and continued support of Beth El! Thank you so very, very much!

Another area of focus has been our schools. Due to the ebb and flow of the pandemic, this has been fluid and changing. The true impact on our fiscal year will not be known until we have the enrollment figures for the January session. Those figures are not available in time for this article, but we will be sure to inform you in future communications.

What we do know is that our schools are doing fabulous work!

The Steinberg Pre-School is currently

operating outdoors and plans to move classes indoors in January. The Cohen Religious School is currently using a virtual learning model. Be assured that our schools will continue to operate in accordance with the strictest safety guidelines.

Over the next few months we'll continue to be busy.

The Nominating Committee has already begun working on the next slate of Officers, board members and trustees who will serve you and Beth El next year.

Our Finance Committee will shortly begin the budget process for the upcoming fiscal year. With so many unknowns, I would expect the need to look at various contingency scenarios again for '20/'21.

Our Strategic Planning Task Force is completing their work and we await their thoughts on the how best to prepare

Notes from Hazzan Tisser



Bechirot - Choices

Life is full of choices. At virtually every moment of every day, we make choices – some intentional, and some unintentionally. Some choices might be considered more major and others more mundane, but all of these choices add up to the sum total of our lives.

The Hebrew word for choices is *Bechirot*, from the root בחר (to choose). I looked up this root in the Torah and found 44 instances of it. The first is in Genesis 6:2 when the *B'nei Ha-Elohim* (often referred to as “divine beings”) saw how beautiful human women were and took wives from among the choicest of them.

The most common use of this root in the Torah has to do with “the place that the Lord your God will choose” (במקום אשר יבחר), having to do with the location of the Temple and sacrifices.

There is, however, one use of this root which stands out from the rest. Only once does it come in the form of a mitzvah – a commandment. In Deuteronomy 30:19 we are commanded, “...and you shall choose life so that you shall live, you and your offspring.” These famous words, “*u-vacharta ba-chayim*,” are words that have carried me, and I am sure many others, through the highs and lows of life.

We are coming off contentious Presidential elections. We are heading into the fourth quarter of the first (halevai, only) year of this pandemic. There are fires burning out west and



terror attacks throughout Europe on people of all walks of life. The world is a seemingly dark place. This is the time when we must remember just weeks back to what we read at the end of *Parashat Nitzavim* – it is our obligation, even in the face of darkness, to choose life. How lucky are we to be taught, commanded, and reminded annually to choose positivity, life, and blessing! Rashi teaches us about this verse that it is as if a parent says to their child “Choose for yourself a good piece of real estate,” sets his son in front of the best piece of land, and says, “Choose this!”

The choice is ours. The weather is cold, the skies cloudy, darkness sets in early...it’s easy and natural to let this affect us. But we are an *Am Kadosh* – a holy, separate nation. It is our outlook on life, our obligation to mitzvot, which sets us apart. I pray that during these cold and dark months, during this pandemic, and with everything else going on in the world, we are able to remind ourselves, and to support each other in choosing life, positivity, and blessing. We really have so much to be grateful for, and we are lucky to have the support of an entire community to make it through.

As we have said always, and especially during these last trying months: we, your clergy, are here for you. If you are having difficulty at any time, reach out to us; if you want to catch up or share about your life and family, reach out to us. In allowing us to support you, you support us and strengthen our community. And, watch for the many exciting programs and classes we will hold throughout the winter months – life is always better when we are together, even if only on Zoom.

Remote Learning Fosters Creativity

Challenging the Way Things Are

It's Shabbat, and my kids are singing along with Hazzan Barnett in the other room. Whether they understand it fully or not, they have been singing along that loving our neighbor as ourselves is the main essence of Torah and Judaism for years. "This is Torah" they chant.

It has been so exciting to watch our community push itself ever further to understand each other and prioritize care for others, including listening and advocating, responding and stretching in our understandings. As I prepare to teach a course this winter called **"The Heart of Judaism in Theory and Practice"** from the Melton School of Adult Jewish Learning, certain phrases keep jumping out at me. "We encourage compassionate listening and thoughtful, judicious dialogue," implores the welcome note by Ruth Messinger, global ambassador and former director

of American Jewish World Service. Through this trying time, we all want to ground our good work in Jewish principles, and to understand how Jews have historically thought about the issues and challenges we face.

A course like this would be important for Jews at any time. That is because it emphasizes our commitment to pursue justice, to go beyond individual care giving and service mitzvot, to challenge the way things are. It comports directly to the teaching of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel that, "In a free society where terrible wrongs exist, some are guilty but all are responsible."

We feel drawn to learn but also to do more. We know that responding to need or suffering in the world is central to Jewish tradition. Often we use terms interchangeably like chesed, tzedek, tikkun olam, and tzedakah. In secular

society, too, this work is referred to in different ways: social justice, charity, activism, service, and advocacy—often without making sufficient distinctions. In this course we will work to unpack this language and parse out our own response to the problems of our world.

I hope there will be a cohort of us who will meet together to do the difficult work of acknowledging our own contributions to societal challenges, to learning how to address societal ills systemically, and to believing like our ancestors that we can make our world better.

It has been our commitment to keeping you informed on all these topics and more,

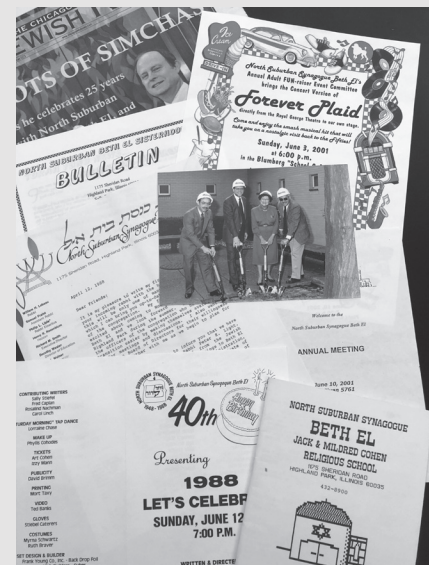

Bringing on the Light

We are heading into the darkest time of the year. The sun rises later; it sets earlier. In our part of the country, the temperatures are beginning to venture from seasonably cool to the land of, "OMG, it's freezing cold this morning. Do I really have to walk the dog?"

On the other hand, the later sunrise also makes a beautiful sunrise over the lake more accessible, and I remember last winter (my first at Beth El) allowing myself to feel the power and awe of sunrise just before or during the middle of our morning Shacharit services as it washed through the Beit Midrash glass.

The night sky, too, lets us into earlier view of the stars and planets, and it can be worth the momentary chill to catch a glimpse of Saturn or Mars or a distant star so clearly in the night sky, and share it with a younger child or grandchild who, in the summer might already be asleep when it's dark enough to view the canvas of cochavim (stars).

We gravitate toward light; we enjoy the lights of the winter season—whether it's the nearby Botanic Gardens with its winter light show, or sparkle of new-fallen snow under the moonlight,

just to name two. And of course, there's Hanukkah, which we celebrate this year mid-December. Hanukkah, the Festival of Lights. The celebration of a miracle—that small cruse of pure oil, needed to relight the menorah in the Temple lasted, against all odds, for eight days.

As it is written upon the letters of the dreidel (Nun, Gimel, Hey, Shin) in acronym: "a great miracle happened there." Or, if you are in Israel, replace the "shin" with a "pay" and "there" with "here."

Then, there is, of course, the miracle of a small band of zealous Jews who refused to give into the oppressive demands of the Syrian-Greeks, led by the tyrant Antiochous.

Perhaps, the miracle of the tiny vessel that prevailed against all odds to last far longer than anyone might have anticipated is a metaphor for the rebellion. The defeat of the mighty by the small and inspired—it is a proud tradition for us to remember. A miracle in the midst of certain defeat—the spirit of the few prevailing over the physical might of the powerful. A shining light in the

midst of darkness.

The Baal Shem Tov, 18th Century founder of Chassidism, said, "From every human being there rises a light that reaches straight to heaven." Each of us has within us the light, the spark of the Divine, to prevail against the odds and do amazing things.

The prophet Zechariah says in the haftarah for Shabbat Hanukkah, "Not by might, and not by power, but by my spirit..." Perhaps we are meant, at this time of the year ("ba'zeman hazeh") to rededicate ourselves in the darkest, coldest time of the year to renewing that spark of light that resides in all of us.

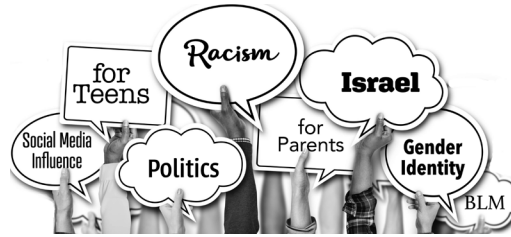

Straight Talk With Youth and Teens

Each bulletin is an opportunity for the Youth Department to highlight programs and individuals in our community. In coordination with Beth El's theme of the year, *Love your Neighbor as Yourself*, we are inviting teens and their parents to challenge themselves in reaching out to strangers and inviting them in through social justice virtual discussions. Over two sessions, with the help of Billy Planer from Etgar36, teens and parents have started in "conversation workshops" where, as a group, we will work on moving as a community beyond initial conversations, and ask



ourselves "what's next?" Back in November our first discussion – how to be comfortable having uncomfortable conversations – took place. America is so split and to speak across the divide often feels impossible. Within this session, the group participated in discussions about race, politics, or Israel that often seem too heated or contentious to have. These

important and necessary conversations can be difficult, but together the group began to learn how to have these conversations and practice self-care as we entered them. In January, we will host the second discussion, *Jews and Blacks in the Civil Rights Era and Now* Midrash and Fact. During this session, we will explore the reality of the relationship between the Jewish and Black communities during the Civil Rights era.

Everything Bagel Seasoning is Just EVERYTHING!

While the history of the EVERYTHING Bagel is obscure and a virtual food fight with so many people claiming the iconic foodstuff's creation, we know one thing for sure, the resulting seasoning is versatile, delicious and mouthwateringly good.

I don't eat bagels very often as I am trying to eat in a super healthy way. I do, however, crave the flavor of the EVERYTHING bagel. Little bits of charred onions and garlic, toasted sesame, flakes of crunchy sea salt and crunchy poppy seeds and because we Chicagoans like to do things our way, the local version has a sprinkle of chili flakes that wakes up your palate. YUM! I have some ideas on how to get the flavor into healthier options.

While you can easily find EVERYTHING Bagel Seasoning in stores and online, it is much better to make your own. Homemade seasoning lets you control the freshness of ingredients, salt content and allows for some interpretations. Sesame seeds sitting in a jar can become rancid and ruin the whole mix. Making your own seasoning is simple, fast and fresher, plus making your own allows for some fun variations.

Start with the mix I have written here and add some of your own twists like: black sesame seeds for a nutty flavor, caraway seeds for a toasty rye flavor, fennel seeds for a licorice flavor, cummin seeds for a smoky flavor and more. I love making my own mix and have a small container of it next to where I sauté. When I need a little extra "something" a pinch of EVERYTHING adds flavor and texture.



Making your own Everything

The mix is so addictingly delicious, you will find yourself sneaking it into... well EVERYTHING!

¼ cup poppy seeds

¼ cup toasted sesame seeds (toast sesame seeds in a dry pan over medi-

um heat until lightly golden brown)

2 tablespoons dried garlic flakes (not garlic salt!)

2 tablespoons dried onion flakes (not onion salt)

1 tablespoon coarse sea salt

1 teaspoon crushed chili flakes (optional-I am from Chicago and this is what we add!)

1. Mix together and store in a covered jar at room temperature for up to 3 months.

EVERYTHING Roasted Vegetables

Roasting vegetables is easy. Cut your vegetables to the same size so they cook at the same rate. Be sure the veggies are dry. Drizzle generously with extra virgin olive oil. Sprinkle with EVERYTHING seasoning and a bit of freshly cracked black pepper. Place in a pre-heated oven.

Serves 5+

1 ½ pounds seasonal vegetables (such as: diced winter squash, sliced mushrooms, root vegetables such as parsnips, sweet potatoes, turnips, celery root, finely shredded cabbage,

cauliflower and broccoli) cut into dice or julienne

Extra virgin olive oil
3 tablespoons EVERYTHING seasoning

Freshly cracked black pepper
Line a sheet pan with parchment paper
Preheat oven to 375F

1. Toss vegetables with evoo, EVERYTHING mix, freshly cracked black pepper. Scatter vegetables on lined sheet pan and roast, stirring occasionally, until cooked through and lightly browned.
2. Adjust seasoning with sea salt if needed before serving,

Crispy EVERYTHING Schnitzel with Almond Flour

This recipe is LOW CARB! Start the new year off with a healthy, protein packed and seriously delicious low-carb version of your favorite chicken. Crispy, tender and deliciously flavored chicken that is pan-fried and LOW CARB! This is a weekly staple in my house. I serve this with roasted vegetables and drizzle generous amounts of tahini over the whole plate. YUM!



¾ cup almond flour
½ cup psyllium husk (available at most grocery stores and online. This ingredient makes breading pliable and retains moisture, so it won't crumble and will still be very crispy)
3 heaping tablespoons Everything Seasoning
Zest of 1 lemon
Sea salt
Freshly cracked black pepper
4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, pounded thinly
2 egg whites
½ cup extra virgin olive oil

Place a cooling rack over a parchment lined

sheet pan. This will ensure the schnitzel stays very crispy.

Preheat oven to 350F.

1. Whisk together almond flour, psyllium husks, Everything seasoning and zest. Place mixture on a large sheet of parchment.
2. Whisk egg whites with 1 tablespoon water in a small bowl.
3. Season pounded chicken breasts with salt and pepper.
4. Place a large sauté pan with about ½ inch of oil over medium-high heat.
5. Dredge chicken in egg white mixture and dip chicken into almond flour mix. Be sure to coat chicken thoroughly with dry mix.
6. Place chicken in heated oil and cook until golden brown on one side. Turn and cook on other side.
7. Transfer chicken to a cooling rack.
8. About 7 minutes before serving, transfer chicken on cooling rack to preheated oven and continue cooking for about 5-7 minutes until cooked through and sizzling.
