The Sacred Seder: A Touchstone of Meaning

Everyone waxes nostalgic at times. Some of us do it quite often. We look into our past and we relive a powerful experience, a meaningful event, or a cherished time. Such reflection often brings us comfort and it can reconnect us with what is most important to us in our lives. Many kinds of occasions can become the subject of nostalgia but, more often than not, most represent times when we were surrounded by people we love, at moments of significance, especially during times of joy. future. The Passover seder, in many ways, acts as our Jewish compass helping us to better understand who we are and, therefore, serves to guide us to where we need to go.

Every year I tell anyone who will listen that the more one puts into the preparations for the seder night, the more one will get out if it in return. Making the content of the Seder interesting, interactive, meaningful and fun allows the Seder experience to go even beyond a wonderful meal with family and

For me, the Passover seder unfailingly sends me into the world of nostalgia. Years of past Sedarim cycle through my head. Precious memories of times spent with family



memories of times spent with family members, some of whom who are no longer alive and some of whom who are no longer alive part of my seder, suddenly become tangible and vivid. I can smell the food, hear the laughter and feel the warmth. While many of us complain about the lack of bread and the poor taste of matzah, the reality is that this is one of the most meaningful and most celebrated holidays on the Jewish calendar. Much of that, I believe, stems from the powerful entwinement of our personal memories with the collective memory of our people. This is a holiday, which, perhaps like no other, actively builds Jewish identity and connects us as individuals to the on-going story of the Jewish people. "I" becomes "We". Our family customs become intertwined with the ancient customs of our ancestors. Our present intermingles with our past – creating a new and powerful

history and with my Jewish heritage, all at once, in

an emotionally compelling way.

With some forethought, participants can come away with a deeper appreciation for their freedoms, a greater understanding of the Jewish past, a deeper connection to their family history and a greater affinity for their Jewish identity. Any time we have the opportunity to engage

in Jewish identity building and family bonding, we should seize it! And the seder night might be the greatest opportunity for many of us each year.

Jewish education is crucial, Jewish camping is wonderful, and synagogue life is essential. However, a vibrant and meaningful Jewish home life is also vital to the continuation of the Jewish people. So please, wax nostalgic in advance of the Passover holiday, remember what made your sedarim of the past so meaningful and help create memories that will sustain you and the participants at your table well into the future. And if you don't have nostalgia for past Passovers, there is no time like the present to create an experience worthy of such memories! Feel free to consult with me or Rabbi Freedman on wonderful resources to enhance your seder, especially in a year when we still may need to conduct our sederim virtually. Whatever you do, I wish you a meaningful Passover filled with memorable moments, which can help each person connect in a lasting way with our beautiful tradition.f Hag Sameah – Have a Happy Passover holiday!

As our national Hebrew poet Chaim Nachman Bialik reminds us in his poem Tzanach Lo Zalzal - A Long Bough - "Spring will blossom again." We plan to celebrate and commemorate the Jewish spring holidays adding new meanings and understandings to reflect our collective trauma caused by the pandemic. Past Jewish literary creations, such as the Pesach Haggadah, Holocaust literary creations, and Israeli literature, will once again provide us an anchor and help us heal by developing our sensitivity to suffering and by showing us ways to overcome challenges.

Our students are engaged in meaningful projects connecting to our rich Jewish history and the people of Israel. To this effect, we conducted several virtual field trips to Israel to connect with the people and the land. Our us multiple times a day to be grateful, to be thankful for what we have, and to use that grateful energy to spark the good we can do.

In the midst of this strange year, several Jewish organizations joined together to guide each other on a journey to



For three days each month, this pop-up community offers extra exercises to increase resilience and hope at a time when we may need them most. It's called Days of Gratitude. increase resilience and find hope.

Days of Gratitude is framed around the Jewish tradition of blessings and seeks to ground us in the moments that matter, help us count our blessings, and bless what really counts. By marking these moments, we hope to become more attuned to the good around us and see ourselves as part of a more just, compassionate, and engaged world. In May 2021, Days of Gratitude will culminate with a seven-day worldwide celebration of gratitude, leading up to the festival of Shavuot.

By celebrating Shabbat and holidays together, learning something in a class or reading a Jewish book, by relishing the flavor of a new recipe- we can stop and use this slowed down time to savor the pleasures and opportunities we have, and to spend our days in gratitude.

Our high school students are diving deep into thought-provoking discussions on Jewish ethics. This enriching experience is made possible by the coming together of teens, clergy, and educational directors from four synagogues.

We are proud of our students for showing tremendous resilience and wit. Thank you to our parents for trusting our staff to continue our educational mission during these trying times. A heartfelt thanks to the entire school staff for their creativity and positive outlook as we navigate the new educational reality.

Ritual Director

The Jewish people (that would be us) are often called "am ha-sefer," People of the Book. The most important "book" to us is the Torah; we read it four times weekly, a new portion of it each week, on holidays and other observance days during the year.

The Torah is a gift, given at Mount Sinai, to be our inheritance generation upon generation. But it is a gift that can't be neglected nor taken for granted, but must be used, studied, turned and turned to grasp at the meanings and subtext that weave in and throughout its words and ornamented letters, which seem to leap from the scroll, living and vibrant, inscribed by hand on kosher parchment with care and skill.

But it is not only the teachings and content of Torah that must be preserved, but the scrolls themselves. The Torah scroll must be perfect—no faded, missing or misshapen letters—in order to be used and read publicly during services. Many of our Torahs are close to 100 years old!

They have been around for generations, and to make sure they are passed down for generations to come, every once-in-awhile, it's important to make



sure the Torahs are in tip-top, perfect condition—before we encounter a problem in the middle of a Shabbat morning Torah reading (for example). Over the course of time, we identified through use several NSS Beth El Torahs we knew were in need of repair—some minor, some major, and although we had enough Torahs, what would happen if we found another rendered "pasul" (not-kosher).

So, what's a shul to do?

The very week after we read in the Torah about the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai in the Torah portion called Yitro, we invited master sofer (a very specialized type of scribe—and as he calls himself, a "Holy Roller") Rabbi Moshe Druin to evaluate NSS Beth El's Torahs and institute the repairs he could over a two-day visit so we will have a plenty of Kosher Torahs to serve the community for years to come.

You might think, perhaps, that five Torahs seem like a lot of scrolls when we read one portion a week. But there are Shabbatot and other times of the year, when we read from three Torahs in one service! That happens every year on Simchat Torah, and this year, when Shabbat Hanukkah and a special Shabbat called Shabbat Shekalim both coincided with Rosh Chodesh (the

of Highland Park High School's JSU (Israel Interest) club.


Leah Seidman

Comfort, Health and Security a Top Priority

Even though Beth El remains closed for regular programming and meetings, our maintenance team, headed by Facilities Manager John Patrascu and his crew, Edward Aronson, George Bora, and Michelle Fetea have been hard at work cleaning, painting, and making necessary repairs to the building so that everything will look great and work properly when we are finally able to resume normal operations.

Once we do reopen, you will see that everything is much brighter, especially the Cohen Religious School and Steinberg Pre-School, where we have replaced all lighting with energy efficient LED fixtures and bulbs. We have also added LED lighting to the Horwitz-Hoffman Youth Lounge and the Grossinger-Brickman Activity Room. As you enter the Joseph and Mae Gray Cultural & Learning Center, you will notice that the carpet on the Grand Staircase has been replaced with a beautiful carpet runner, and the woodwork has been completely restored, returning this unique feature of our building to something close to its

original grandeur. In addition, you will see that we have added new directional signage throughout the building.

Pre-pandemic, we received a very generous grant from the United States Department of Homeland Security. In January, we used the funds from this grant to install new access control systems for both our school and office entrances and added wheelchair accessible doors. We also added keypad access to all student classroom doors. In addition, we installed a new 20-camera security system, that allows us to monitor activity around the entire building and parking lot. All video cameras can be viewed by fixed monitors in the building as well as remotely on our computers, tablets, and even our phones. This system will allow our security personnel as well as the Highland Park Police to monitor our building as well. After the unfortunate riot at the Capitol in DC, I attended a security seminar hosted by the ADL. I was reminded that the safety and security of everyone can be greatly enhanced if our members simply remember, "if you see something out of place, please say something."

As COVID-19 continues to limit the number of congregants who may participate in our in-person services, we continue to make improvements to our video streaming systems in order to provide the best worship experience possible during these challenging times. If you are able to join us for a service or minyan at Beth El, I can assure you that our safety protocols have not wavered. We continue to clean regularly. Everyone is still required to wear a mask in the parking lot and throughout the building. All members and guests receive a temperature scan as they enter the building, and we continue to strictly adhere to all social distancing guidelines.

Everything mentioned above was done to ensure the comfort, health, and security of our membership, guests, clergy, and staff. I look forward to a time shortly when we can all be back together at Beth El!



festival of the new moon—which has its own special Torah reading whenever it comes up as well).

Rabbi Druin took over the Zell Activity Room, unrolling all the Torahs, covering tables nearly the length of the room with Torahs open to the air, partially unrolled. When I asked him why he did that, he explained that the one thing a Torah most needs for longevity is...Oxygen! First they all needed some air to breathe. Made of living material—animal hide parchment, they needed what every organic thing needs.

Some of you might have dropped by during his visit via Torah Cam to ask questions or simply observe Rabbi Druin at work. With keen eyes, a skilled hand, and years of experience Rabbi Druin examined the Torah scrolls for their:

- Overall condition
- Readability and condition of the letters
- Cleanliness and condition of the parchment and the stitching between sections of parchment (did you know that the Torah is not one continuous piece of parchment but a series of hand-stichted-together panels?)
- The condition of our Atzei Chaim/Poles

At the end of his evaluation, Rabbi Druin left us with five usable Torahs and a game plan to continue the restoration work on the rest of the Torahs should we want to have more usable, Kosher Torahs. Rabbi Druin's fascinating work and his wonderful explanations were documented by WGN's Mike Lowe, which aired in a segment on the news in mid-February (and which is available on our website for your viewing pleasure).

We have a great gift in our Torah, one to treasure in what it teaches us, and has taught us from the time of Sinai, the scrolls upon which the words of Torah are written must be cared for to keep them for generations to come.

Forbidden Foods

The following foods are forbidden to Ashkenazic Jews during Pesach: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits and crackers; cereals, coffee substitutes derived from cereals; wheat, barley, oats, rice, dry peas, dry beans, and all liquids which contain ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. (Sephardic Jews have some different practices.)

Permitted Foods

Requiring no kosher l'Pesach label, the following foods are permitted in unopened packages or containers: natural coffee, sugar, tea, salt, pepper, and fresh vegetables (except peas and beans, although string beans are permitted on Pesach).

The following foods are permitted if certified for Pesach use by Rabbinical authority (have a kosher l'Pesach label): matzah, matzah flour, Passover noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, milk, butter, jams, cheese, jellies, relishes, dried fruits and vegetables, salad oils, vegetable gelatin, shortening, vinegar. Wines and liquors are permitted if certified by a Rabbinical authority as fit for Pesach use.

Dishes and Utensils

Only dishes and utensils specially reserved for Pesach should be used with the following exceptions: silverware made entirely of metal if used during the year may be used on Pesach if thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. Metal pots and pans used for cooking purposes only (but not for baking), if made wholly of metal, though used during the year, may be used on Pesach. They must first be thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. The utensils should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between their cleaning and immersion in boiling water. Utensils used for baking during the year cannot be used for Passover. Earthenware, enamelware and porcelain utensils used during the year may not be used. Fine translucent chinaware if not used for a year is permitted if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

Authorities disagree as to the method of kashering drinking glasses. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach or putting them through a dishwasher. A dishwashing machine may be used for Passover after a thorough scouring, non-use for 24 hours and running a complete cycle. Authorities disagree whether a new tray is necessary.

The stove is prepared by a thorough scrubbing and cleansing of all parts, then turning on the ovens and all burners full-flame for one half hour. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned, then put through the self-cleaning cycle.

Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens. Microwave ovens should be cleaned, and then a cup of water placed inside. The oven should be turned on until the water disappears.

A microwave that has a browning element cannot be kashered. In all the above cases the appliance cannot be used for 24 hours prior to kashering.

If the parts of electrical appliances that come into contact with Hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way. If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered.

Non-Passover dishes, pots and Hametz whose ownership has been transferred should be separated, locked up or covered and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Bedikat Hametz (The Search For and Burning of Leaven)

On the evening of Thursday, March 25th, the Search for Leaven, Bedikat Hametz, is conducted. This is a ritual that symbolizes the final cleaning of the house of all Hametz. It is customary to place pieces of bread in various rooms around the house before the search begins – remember how many pieces there are and where they are hidden! The search is conducted with a candle for light and a feather and wooden spoon to collect the Hametz. The Hametz, feather and wooden spoon should be put in a bag and set aside to be burnt in the morning. In the morning – this year on Friday, March 26 – after eating our last meal of Hametz, add any remains from breakfast to the bag of Hametz from the previous night, and burn them outside the home. This is the final act of removal of Hametz from our homes. Hametz not used on Shab-



bat should be burned by 11:54 am. The appropriate prayers for the search for and destruction of Hametz are found at the beginning of every Haggadah.

Mechirat Hametz (Sale of Hametz)

In addition to the thorough cleaning of the house before Pesach, we are commanded to completely free ourselves of leavened products. Anything made from wheat, barley, oats, rye or spelt, which had a chance to leaven (rise or ferment), must be destroyed. Today a simple but meaningful tradition is followed:

- Each Jewish home must be cleaned before Pesach.
- The Rabbi contractually arranges for the sale of the Hametz to a non-Jew so that it will, technically, be out of Jewish possession during Pesach.

• At the end of Pesach, everything in your stored-up area will be repurchased for your immediate use.

Maot Chitim (Portions of

Wheat) It is traditional for Jews who have been blessed by the Almighty to make sure that their less fortunate brethren have all that is necessary to celebrate a joyous Pesach. Special funds for this purpose, known as Maot Chitim, are collected in synagogues throughout the world. Beth El participates in this activity. If you would like to make a contribution to the Maot Chitim fund, please mail it directly to the synagogue, or bring it in personally, and earmark it accordingly. These funds will be distributed to the

Greater Chicago Maot Chitim and other institutions that provide Pesach food to the less fortunate.

Siyyum Bechorim (Fast of the Firstborn)

The ceremony of Siyyum Bechorim will take place following the morning minyan on Thursday, March 25 at 7:00 am, led by congregant Brad Pickard, who recently concluded a Tractate of Talmud. It is customary for the first-born male to fast on the day preceding Passover. In place of the fast, however, tradition developed the practice of concluding a portion of study of a Rabbinic text after which celebration and feasting takes place. The Siyyum Bechorim ceremony is the means of obviating the need for a fast. We encourage all first-born males to attend.

But there are those who see the world as it is and change it. That is the Jewish way."

Environmental Corner



Why this in a Beth El Quarterly? A Midrash says: "Do not spoil and destroy My world for if you do there would be no one to repair it". And, it's not just environmentalists speaking. July, 2020: "The climate crisis poses a systemic threat to financial markets and the real economy, with significant disruptive consequences on asset valuations and our nation's economic stability". This from financial leaders and institutes that together manage almost \$1 trillion in assets. Our goal is to raise awareness and, as we look at the complex challenges, we remember he meaning of tikun olam - Repair the World. This note talks of progress and opportunities in power generation.

Positive steps

- The United States has rejoined the Paris Accord, a voluntary agreement to try to keep global temperature rise in check. This is to help manage melting of glaciers, sea level rise, enhanced drought and wildfires, extreme weather events, etc.
- One area showing real progress is power generation. This is where wind, solar, nuclear etc, are sources that do not produce greenhouse gases and therefore don't contribute to that element of global climate change. We need more renewables making power as global total power demand continues to increase.

- A good news story is that since 2010 many coal based power plants have either closed or have transferred their energy source from coal to natural gas (which is mostly methane). When making the same amount of energy, natural gas will produce only half the greenhouse gas (carbon dioxide) as coal. US coal production is dropping and in 2019 was about one third less than the peak production in 2008. Most of the coal plants that have been shut down are older, less efficient units. All good.
- Parts of the rest of the world are not doing so well.
- Israel is a net producer of natural gas and has made big strides in converting their coal based power units to natural gas. In 2000 more than 70% of Israel's power was generated from coal plants, the rest from oil. In 2019 only 30% of Israels' power came from coal, 60+% from natural gas and a little bit from solar and oil. Great progress.... BUT total Israeli power production rose from 41 to 71 (gigawatt hours whatever they are), so that, in fact, Israeli power generation produced more carbon dioxide in 2019 than in 2000.
- Electric vehicles are here and a tip of the hat to those with an electric vehicle and those thinking about purchasing one. Still, today in the



United States more than half of the energy used to produce electricity, the electric vehicle power supply, comes from coal and natural gas...with most of that from natural gas.

• The contributions of solar, wind, hydro and nuclear together will grow rapidly at the expense of hydrocarbons. This is a very significant move away from coal domination of the sector. Unfortunately, much of the value of going from coal to natural gas is offset today by the leakage of natural gas into the atmosphere. Leakage is reported to be between one and three per cent of the total natural gas produced. Since, for the first few years, emitted natural gas (mostly methane) is up to 80 times as powerful a greenhouse gas as is carbon dioxide, it's easy to see that we would do well to close down leakages wherever we can.

So much to be done and so much CAN be done.

Our next note will focus on opportunities in space heating/cooling.

HAZAK Presents: Butterly Kisses



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Maror or Less - The Bitter Truth About Horseradish

We Jews love our food memories. We have our stand-by recipes that remind us of holidays, family, good times and bad. Horseradish is one of those foods.

Until recently, I could not even look at the root vegetable without the familiar smell taking me to Passover. I could be standing in my kitchen at work, pulverizing the giant root in the middle of a hot summer day, and once I crack open the gnarly knob, I am back at the Seder.

It is funny, because not many foods do that to me. I can eat latkes all year round (and do!) and have occasionally snacked on an orphaned box of matzo I found in a cabinet, months after the holiday. In desperate Chocoholic moments I have greedily gobbled stray gelt and never once thought of Hanukkah.

But Horseradish is different. The pungent aroma is so unique and so.....Pesadich!

Eating a bitter herb is an iconic part of the Seder.

If food items had to win a beauty contest to gain space in your fridge, horseradish would no doubt, not be making the cut. Misshapen, dull colored and just generally unattractive horseradish is the ugly duckling of the root vegetable world. Horseradish has been demoted to condiment status for many people and likely appearing only once a year piled on top of gefilte fish.

Beet and Horseradish Relish

- 14-inch piece of horseradish, peeled
- 1 medium red beet, peeled
- 1 medium carrot, peeled
- 3 tablespoons good quality apple cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 teaspoon sea salt

1. Grate horseradish either in a food processor or with a box grater.

2. Grate beet and carrot. Combine in a mixing bowl with horseradish. Add vinegar, honey and salt.

3. Serve with raw fish, smoked fish or sprinkled over veggies, chicken, beef, salad or whatever!

4. Horseradish is best served immediately after grating as it loses pungency. This relish can be stored for up to 1 day, covered, in the refrigerator.

Mashed Potatoes with Horseradish and Garlic

The first bite of mashed potatoes is always so great and then they kind of lose their luster. Let's face it, the creaminess is great but the flavor is boring!

A scoop of horseradish stirred in adds some KAPOW to potatoes and suddenly boring becomes brilliant.

Serves 5+

2 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds russet potatoes, peeled and cut into dice

- Extra virgin olive oil
- 3 Cloves garlic, minced
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups chicken stock
- 2 teaspoons sea salt
- 1 teaspoon freshly cracked black pepper
- ¹⁄₄ cup grated horseradish
- 1⁄4 cup best quality extra virgin olive oil

I have had a recent awakening with the misunderstood, piquant root and have fallen hopelessly in love. Just a sprinkle of freshly grated horseradish brightens flavors and even intensifies them. Flavors become vibrant and so interesting.

Horseradish is so much better grated right at the moment you need it. The jarred stuff just doesn't cut the mustard (chuckle) and has a ho-hum flavor. The fresh stuff is exciting and lively. The challenge with the fresh stuff is that it goes from WOW to lackluster in a matter of hours. To keep the flavor going, grate fresh horseradish either with a box grater or food processor. Add a couple of tablespoons of vinegar (apple cider or white) and a couple of tablespoons of water. Seal the mixture in a container with a lid and refrigerate. This method will keep the ZING in your horseradish.



Garnishes: thinly sliced scallions, chives, crispy shallots

1. Place a large sauté pan, lightly coated with evoo, over medium heat. Add potatoes and garlic and cook until garlic is fragrant and starting to soften (about 5 minutes).

2. Add stock and cover pan. Simmer until potatoes are fork tender and most of the liquid has been absorbed. Mash potatoes with a potato masher or immersion blender until creamy.

3. Add salt, pepper, horseradish and evoo. Stir to combine. Adjust seasoning with salt and pepper.

4. Garnish and serve.
