Hanukkah: Light Your Candle and Dedicate Yourself Anew

In modern America, Hanukkah is often characterized by the giving of gifts. Our children and grandchildren eagerly anticipate the presents they will receive each night as the family gathers to light the candles. However, as many of you know, the idea of gift giving on Hanukkah is a relatively recent addition to the observance of the holiday. This tradition came

into existence primarily in response to the practice of our Christian neighbors, who began to celebrate Christmas by giving presents to their children.

Yet, despite the modern origin of this custom, on some level, Hanukkah has always been about gifts, though not in a material sense. Consequently, the true

essence of Hanukkah goes well beyond the exchange of tangible items, beyond the historical military victory of the Maccabees, and even beyond the traditional observance of kindling the Hanukkah lights as a way of commemorating the great miracle of the oil. The true gift of Hanukkah actually lies in its profound spiritual essence which has the power to be transformative for each and every Jew.

The Hebrew word, "Hanukkah", actually means "dedication." This is because, after the victory of the Maccabees, the Jewish people were able to redeem the holy Temple, which the Hasmonean Greeks had desecrated and used to store their livestock. In a ceremony that began with the rekindling of the lamps of the sanctuary, the leaders of Israel dedicated the

In other words, the gift given to us on the holiday of Hanukkah is embodied in its ability to inspire us, today, to dedicate ourselves to a higher purpose in a way that is relevant to each of our current situations.



Temple to the service of God once again.

However, this deed was much more than the physical dedication of a building. This act of dedication had great spiritual and sym-

bolic meaning signifying the re-dedication of the Jewish people to their Judaism and to their core values. The mere fact that the rabbis simply refer to this holiday as the holiday of "dedication," without specifying exactly to what, allows the spiritual power of such a dedication to transcend any specific historical event and allows the holiday to take on multiple meanings. In other words, the gift given to us on the

Reflecting on 5778

When I was first approached about becoming President, I was told that it would only be a couple more meetings a month. I knew better, but little did I fully appreciate then that I would be embarking upon – and engaged in – a journey of such profound historical significance to Beth El. In fact, much of consequence has happened over the past year.

Since becoming President my hair has gotten much grayer, but otherwise it has been an especially meaningful and remarkable endeavor. Indeed, it has not only deepened my knowledge of Judaism and Jewish practice, but also enabled me to viscerally appreciate the significance – and essence of – community, something not only highly valued in our tradition, but also needed more than ever in our increasingly atomized, disconnected and troubling world. In particular, I have been genuinely moved and touched by all those I have closely worked with, as well as by the warmth and affection exhibited by members of the synagogue at large.

Besides the personal rewards, the last year or so has been a critical and exciting time for the synagogue institutionally. Aside from the leadership transition, a number of other significant things have been accomplished. The first is the overwhelming success of the ongoing 70th anniversary celebrations, which have generated lots of goodwill among members of the congregation.

Since last year's High Holidays, an exceptional array of programs and activities have taken place, but there's one other that especially stands out to me. And that's an insightful lecture by Dr. Zev Eleff about the historical development of the Conservative movement in the Chicago area, where I learned that Beth El played a leading role in promoting a more traditional brand of Conservative Judaism in our community. This gave me a deeper understanding of the context within which the synagogue was founded and the importance of carrying on that legacy in the future.

In addition to the warm feelings created by the 70th anniversary events, I am delighted to inform you that the synagogue's Capital Campaign, which is Chaired by Karen Kesner, with Stuart Hochwert and Larry Pachter as Co-chairs, is off to a tremendous start. To date, nearly \$5 million has been raised to support three major initiatives or pillars: 1) a senior Rabbinic Chair in honor of Rabbi Kurtz; 2) a Physical Accessibility and Disability Inclusion Fund; and 3) a Family Engagement Fund and Center. For example, the recent renovation of the Field Family Sanctuary – it looks great, doesn't it? - was made possible thanks to an extremely generous gift from the grandchildren of Eli and Dina Field and the Field Family Foundation. I am also thrilled to announce that the Zell family has made a very generous pledge to renovate the South Wing of the synagogue. This transformational project will include the remodeling of the Zell activity room, the addition of a multi-purpose room for parents and toddlers, and the installment of a three-floor elevator to provide handicapped accessibility to that area of the building, among other things. If you have already contributed to the Capital Campaign, many thanks for your generous support. If not, I would I would be very grateful if you would consider doing so.

I would also strongly encourage you to join us for Beth El's special Gala weekend on November 2-4, beginning with a congregational Shabbat dinner on Friday evening, followed by an extended Kiddush the next day, and culminating with a fun and festive dinner honoring Rabbi Vernon and Bryna Kurtz on the occasion of the synagogue's 70th anniversary, along with the 70th anniversary of the State of Israel. Special thanks and appreciation goes to the Co-chairs of the weekend's activities for their able leadership and hard work: Pearl and Joel Kagan; Wendy and Steve Abrams; and Jenna and David Smiley. These celebratory events are not to be missed, so I very much look forward to seeing you there.



My Take Away? Take-Out Shabbat!

The dryer broke. One of the kids is sick and the other has to be pushed to do their reading comprehension homework. You're past deadline on a work project and your spouse is out of town. Whatever your particular busy 21st century week looks like, Friday night is coming. We want to be like God in the creation story - reflecting back on the work week and feeling that it's good, and teaching our families about the value of rest. We want to provide family meals and invite guests and enact the values we spend our hard earned money to day school and religious school tuition to support. Getting Shabbat dinner to happen in a traditional manner - warm savory chicken soup, fresh homemade challah, candles lit, guests and extended family singing songs and prayerscan feel like an overwhelming task that many of us aren't up to doing.

For some of us, the answer is a shortcut- my sister is a proponent of what she calls "Take-Out Shabbat." With the busy jobs that she and her husband do, Friday night home-cooked meals aren't going to happen on a regular basis. Her solution is to make sure that the table is set, the candles are lit, the blessings are said- and not stress out about who made the dinner. When I was growing up, Shabbat dinners were often hosted by my retired Bubbe, freeing up my mom to worry about all the other things that went into raising a family at the end of the week. I feel that this is definitely an area, even for those of us without local family, where a synagogue community is very important. Having people who host each other and make Shabbat for each other is wonderful, though not always offered or feasible. There is no one-size-fits-all solution. In our family, we have found that we have benefited from trying out different ways of getting Shabbat to happen.

On Friday December 14, we are offering a special **Shabbat Experience for Families with Young Children in 1st grade and younger.**

For the cost of \$25/family, we will have a teaching traditional Shabbat dinner starting at 6:00 p.m. Let us help you make Shabbat for your family and give you tips and tricks that make Shabbat more manageable for families with young children at home. And then the next week, maybe reach out to a family you've been meaning to connect with and see if you can get together for Shabbat!

A Beth El History Book in Honor of Our 70th Anniversary

Right around the time of the 65th anniversary of Beth El, Mort Steinberg began to formally organize the synagogue's archives. Gathering various boxes, file folders, photographs, and artifacts scattered all over the building – from hidden away closets upstairs to the depths of our massive basement, from the safe under

the stairs in the library to the staff and clergy offices -

Mort came to Beth El every week to work on the Archives. We emptied out the VHS closet in the Kaye Reading Room and created a dedicated space for these treasures. We purchased acid-free archival folders, boxes, and supplies, and Mort got to work sorting, labeling, identifying, and organizing. Mort also gave some presentations about the history of the Price Mansion and the beginnings of Beth El to various synagogue groups and Jerry Blumberg led "behind the scenes" tours of the building. Congregants were fascinated and had lots of questions. It became apparent that we needed to update and formalize Beth El's histo-

ry, first drafted by Helen Weisel and Leonard Birnbaum, into a published book.


Tradition by the Lake: A Historical Outline of North Suburban Synagogue Beth El by Mort Steinberg will be published in November 2018 in time for our gala celebration honoring Rabbi Vernon and Bryna Kurtz

and the 70th anniversary of Beth El. With over 200 pages of text and more than 70 photographs and archival documents, Tradition by the Lake details the founding and growth of Beth El into one of the leading Conservative congregations in the United States. The book relates the challenges, difficulties and conflicts encoun-

> tered throughout the synagogue's history, but also describes its amazing accomplishments, achievements and successes.

> Mort has dedicated countless hours to this project and we cannot thank him enough for creating this amazing resource for our community. Additionally, this project would not have been possible without the help and support of Rabbi Kurtz, Marcie Eskin, Abby Lasky, and Jonathan Fields along with all of the lay leaders (past and present), congregants, and staff members who shared their memories, expertise, files, and photographs with us. The Cohen/Hirschfield Families Make Education a Priority

This article is dedicated to Bernice and Benjamin Cohen and the entire Cohen and Hirschfield families, who have dedicated so much of their lives enriching the lives of our children through their commitment to Jewish education at NSS Beth El.

This year, the Jack and Mildred Cohen Religious School at North Suburban Synagogue Beth El has the honor and privilege of being the recipient of a groundbreaking new Fund, the Lois & Howard Hirschfield Incentive Fund.

This generous gift, given by Bernice and Benjamin Cohen, is singlehandedly providing free tuition for the Bet Class for three years. It honors the memory of Benjamin's late sister Lois, and his brother in-law, Howard Hirschfield.

Called Second To None, this program offers the opportunity for families to be introduced to religious education at an early age. It taps into a second grader's natural sense of curiosity, enthusiasm and excitement for learning, by allowing them to experience the joy of

learning a new language, Jewish traditions and rituals, and the basics of reading Torah.

The Fund has already increased enrollment in the Jack & Mildred Cohen Religious School at NSS Beth El this year by 33%. We have 27 children enrolled in this program, versus eighteen last year.

Because of this gift, NSS Beth El's Jack and Mildred Cohen Religious School is now able to attract families who would have otherwise selected to participate in different Hebrew school programs. More importantly, families feel special that we have targeted this age group by offering the financial assistance to start their children early on the road to a solid Jewish education.



Nothing like this program has ever been offered in any synagogue on the North Shore of Chicago before, and this groundbreaking gift has already made a difference in the lives of so many families. We cannot thank Bernice and Benjamin Cohen enough for their continued generosity and support of Jewish education at NSS Beth El.



Beth El History Corner

A special edition of the Beth El Bulletin promoting the synagogue's First Annual Dinner Dance. This was the first major fundraising campaign undertaken jointly by the congregation, the Sisterhood and the Men's Club. The goal was to raise, primarily through the sale of advertisements for an Ad Book, \$40,000 to complete and equip the new school building. Co-chairs of the Dinner Dance were Charles Podolsky, Saul Pohn and Jack Borkan, who



promised that the event would "surpass all other organizational festivities of the 1952 and 1953 North Shore social season." The dinner dance was held at the Morrison Hotel in Chicago, the first Chicago hotel to maintain a kosher kitchen. The dedication of the new school building took place in September, 1953. Pictured speaking at the dinner dance is Harold Blumberg, president of Beth El, later to be known as "Mr. Beth El."

An early meeting of the Beth El Sisterhood with Beth El's Cantor Stanley Martin. The meeting most likely occurred in the early 1950s. It took place in the living room of the Price Estate, now the Maxwell Abbell Library. Visible behind the cantor is the mantel above the fireplace still located in the Library. Cantor Martin served the congregation from 1949 to 1953, when he left to work in the insurance business. Torah Study is Equivalent to ALL Other Mitzvot

I have yet to meet a parent for whom education is not important. Jewish parents, in particular, understand that learning is ingrained in our tradition and should be transferred from one generation to the next. The hallmark of the three Beth El schools is based on the teachings of the lewish tradition and on modern

educational principles, which are based on traditional Jewish methods. In other words, "What" is being taught is as important as "How" we teach it. The following are a few nuggets of the guiding principles of the educational philosophy applied at the Beth El schools.

The written word is at the heart of our tradition, based on the study of Torah and other Jewish texts. In contrast to the in vogue "visual


world," - ours - is a Written tradition. We teach Words of Torah to the young and old, in large and small groups, at first in the vernacular, and then in Hebrew. Since no individual is exempt from the obligation to study, our schools are committed to providing flexible and suitable accommodations for the modern Jewish family. Our schedule is flexible; we offer classes every day of the week as well as summer programs. In addition, we celebrate Shabbat with a weekly service and observe all Jewish holidays. Jewish tradition cherishes individual differences stressing that every child should be taught according to his/her own ability. This principle has informed our offerings; we provide individual and small group classes for children with different learning styles, as well as classes for parents, and parents' professional support.

> We encourage students' curiosity by providing multi-modal teaching styles. We place the student at-the center, recognizing that each student is unique and learns differently. We acknowledge that students learn best when they are engaged and understand the relevance of what they learn to daily life. Our schools apply the broader concept of playing for it is one of-the best avenues to solidify and review learning. The schools are fortunate to have state-of-the-art-tech-




