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Judaism's Gift of Hope and Renewal

As summer draws to a close, the holiday of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, draws near. Thinking of this important day usually stirs within us solemn images of prayer, contrition, hunger and introspection. The day parallels the task; atonement is hard and important work.

Yet, Yom Kippur carries with it an additional, more subtle aspect, that nonetheless is critical to fully understanding its essence. Viewed in the

context of the entire season, and the holidays that surround it, its customs take on new meaning and along with its solemnity communicate the uplifting message of everlasting hope and refreshing renewal.

We start with Yom

Kippur's antecedent, Rosh Hashanah. What we call the New Year is not labeled as such in the Torah. In fact, the Torah says little about this holiday other than that it is the holiday of sounding the blasts of the shofar. What is even more strange is that the Torah identifies the month that both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur fall, as the seventh month. This is actually the furthest point from the start of the Biblical year, which is the first of the month of Nisan in the Spring. How can we have a new year in the seventh month? What is the significance of our tradition's designation of Rosh Hashanah as such?

First, it is clear that for Yom Kippur to succeed in its purpose, it cannot, as Douglas Aronin wrote, "appear suddenly and alone, without giving us an opportunity to prepare for it. Teshuvah is a lengthy process and a difficult one. The more opportunity to reflect . . . the greater the

likelihood that we will be successful." Thus, the Shofar of Rosh Hashanah prepares us for the incredibly important work of Yom Kippur.

And this call to preparation is not done in the context of doom and gloom. In fact, the attitude of our tradition is that we relish this opportunity and celebrate it. Therefore, Rosh Hashanah is sweet, upbeat and joyous. We are grateful that soon we will have the opportunity to start again

- to be renewed. Hope is palpable on Rosh Hashanah because of the power of Yom Kippur.

What is more, there is an important lesson embedded in the fact that Rosh Hashanah falls a full six months after the beginning of the Biblical new year. As Arnonin writes, "By

placing the season of teshuva in the seventh month - as far as possible from the chronological beginning of the year - the Torah reminds us that it is our teshuva, not the calendar, that has the capacity to provide us with that fresh start. However mired we are in the patterns of our lives, however overwhelmed by the seemingly insurmountable task of self-improvement, we have the capacity - especially in this season but ultimately in any season - to begin our return to God. 'Return us, O Lord, to yourself, and let us return. Renew our days as of old." (Lamentations 5:21) Yom Kippur may be a single day but the ability to renew ourselves is embedded in the philosophy of our tradition and can be done at any time. This is the ultimate message of hope.

On Yom Kippur itself, many see our customs as actually enacting death, by denying ourselves normal human pleasures. But as Rabbi Irving continued on page 8



Mit a hartsikn dank – Heartfelt thanks from Yiddish Book Center

We recently did some "spring cleaning" and made the decision to donate our collection of 146 Yiddish books from the Abbell Library to the Yiddish Book Center in Amherst, MA.

These books hadn't been touched in many years and it just didn't make sense for us to keep them at Beth El. Bibliographer David Mazower considers our donation a "Yiddish book miracle!" We had six pristine copies of Ezra Korman's rare 1920s anthology of Yiddish women; only 1500 of these books were ever published!

Other gems included an oversize Bergen Belsen post-1945 album and Zelig Heller's 1926 poetry collection

illustrated by Todros Geller. The Yiddish Book Center is so thrilled with our donation that they offered to do a private program for Beth El on Wednesday evening, October 20 (see page 26 for details) with the Center's founder and president Aaron Lansky.

We are so proud that these rare and precious treasures will now be accessible free online, distributed to college classrooms and libraries around the world, and preserved for future generations of researchers and scholars. Greenberg writes, "It is not a morbid experience, however, because this encounter with death is in the service of life. The true goal is a new appreciation of life. To know how fragile the shell of life is, is to learn to handle it with true grace and delicacy. Only one who realizes the vulnerability of loved ones can treasure every moment with them. The encounter with death turns the individual toward life."

This is why the tone of the Days of Awe is basically hopeful, even joyful. This is why the liturgy bursts with life. "Remember us for life, King who loves life; write us in the book of life, for your sake, Lord of Life." As Greenberg continues, "This holiday season seeks nothing

less than the removal of sin and the renewal of love." As our liturgy states, "For I do not desire the death of the wicked, but that he turn from his paths—and live." To turn is to be reborn. At the conclusion of Yom Kippur we see ourselves as nothing less than forgiven, pure and at one with God. This is surely something to celebrate!

And then come the days of the delirious joy of Sukkot, with its celebration of harvest, of life-giving water, and of the produce of the field. As Greenberg writes, "the days of Sukkot are the response to the denial and self-criticism of the High Holy Days. The two periods together give one the capacity to live through triumph and tragedy, aware that this, too, shall

pass. Life in all its bewildering and uncontrollable variety becomes possible."

Thus, as we enter into this incredibly powerful holiday season, the structure of our holidays implores us to immerse ourselves in the important work of Teshuvah, to reconnect with the essence of life, and to change for the better. What is more, we are encouraged to do so with a heart filled with hope and with our mind filled with gratitude for the opportunity for life-giving renewal - to be granted the ability to move forward with blessing no matter what has happened in the past. Shanah Tova U'metukah! May this be a year filled with hope, renewal and joy!


On the Bimah

The ark doors, Eternal light (ner tamid), and menorah on Beth El's Bimah were created by Yehuda Ludwig Wolpert, known as the father of modern Judaica. Models for these works, generously donated to the Rissman Kol Ami Collection by the family of Leonard and Marjorie Birnbaum z"l, bond the Birnbaums' 60year legacy of service (1955-2015) to the Beth El Bimah.

In 1966, Wolpert's designs were unanimously accepted by the Beth El Board of Directors. Len worked closely with Wolpert, often traveling to the artist's New York studio and foundry to collaborate with him and ensure installation for the 1967 High Holy days.

An Israeli American, Yehuda Ludwig Wolpert (1900-1981) was the son of an Orthodox rabbi. After studying metalwork in his native Germany, he emigrated to Palestine in 1933 and taught at the New Bezalel School of Arts and Crafts in Jerusalem. He came to New York in 1956, having been invited to establish the Tobe Pascher Workshop for Jewish ceremonial objects at the Jewish Museum.




- For the כי יקוק יהיה־לך לאור עולם - For the LORD shall be a light to you forever. Here, flame-tipped letters dance before the ever-present light.

The menorah on the Bimah recalls the one that stood at the Temple in Jerusalem. As described in Exodus 25:31-37, it was gold with six branches, three on each

side. Its base, shaft, and seven cups formed one piece that gave off light. The light of Wolpert's fluid menorah, made of polished bronze arms capped with shallow cups, reflects off the cantilever above. The menorah seems to embrace our clergy seated below. For years, our logo and letterhead, designed by Len Birnbaum, showcased this iconic menorah, a symbol of Beth El's enduring spirit.



Wolpert introduced Hebrew text as the main aesthetic for his art. He worked in a variety of typography styles as seen on our Bimah. The gates for the Aron Kodesh - the holy ark - record the Ten Commandments in bold, rounded Hebrew letters joined one to the next. When the ark is opened, the holy words - G-d is G-d - rendered הי הוא האלהים in Wolpert's attenuated style on the back wall form a stepped pyramid with the sacred abbreviation for G-d at the top. A bronze hemisphere forms the ner tamid, the Eternal light symbolizing G-d's presence in our lives. A verse from Isaiah 60:20 adorns the rim:





Neighborhood Shofar and Tashlich Service, a New Holiday Favorite



Tashlich at the other two sites (at press time, the other two sites are to be de-

termined). At the Synagogue only, after Tashlich, we will daven Mincha.

Tashlich means "cast away," and it is a ceremony observed on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah, in which sins are symbolically cast away into a natural body of water. The term and custom are derived from a verse in the Book of Micah, "He will take us back in love; He will cover up our iniquities, You will hurl all our sins Into the depths of the sea." It's a meaningful, cleansing way to start the New Year and head into Yom Kippur. The teens have done such a lovely job putting together the Tashlich service for us; I hope you'll join us this year for our Neighborhood Shofar and Tashlich services which begin at 6 pm on Tuesday, September 7.

Beth El History Corner

By Mort Steinberg, Author of Tradition by the Lake: A Historical Outline of North Suburban Synagogue Beth El



The "cornerstone" ceremony for Beth El's new school building took place on Sunday afternoon, September 14, 1952. The festivities were organized by congregant William Balkin and featured an engraved slab of Jerusalem stone, imported from Israel for the occasion, being positioned amid the building's first bricks.

That plaque is still in its original location next to the school's office. The ceremony included speeches by Beth El's Rabbi Philip L. Lipis, Rabbi Edgar Siskin of North Shore Congregation

Israel in Glencoe, and various other dignitaries.

However, one of the prominent participants in the ceremony cannot be identified. He is standing to the left of president Harold Blumberg in this photograph.

Beth El has a long tradition of educating its children in the observance of Jewish ritual. Over the years it also has publized such observances in community

publications such as the Highland Park News and the Highland Park Landmark, both of which are no longer published.

This publicity photograph from the Beth El archives, taken in the late 1950s or early 1960s, clearly was intended to publicize the holiday of Hanukkah.

Two teachers from the Beth El religious school pose with three students as they demonstrate lighting the candles of the Hanukkiah. One teacher points to what appears to be a siddur which would contain the appropriate *brachot* for the occsaion. The teachers and students stand on

the bimah located on the stage in what would later be dedicated as the Blumberg Auditorium. Since the Field Family Sancturary had not yet been constructed, they stand in front of the *aron kodesh* which at that time was the primary ark used during Shabbat and Festival services. The teachers and the students are unidentified.



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The Cure for Kitchen Fatigue

Cooking at home, every single day for over one year, has resulted in several revelations for me.

Revelation 1 -I never thought I would dread making dinner. I love cooking

and always make

a fairly complex dinner even after cooking at work all day. At a certain point, I couldn't

take it anymore. I ran out of menus and flavor profiles. I really wished someone would come up with a new vegetable or protein.

Revelation 2 - sometimes a new piece of kitchen equipment can change your game and reinvigorate you. Enter my new/old love affair with my mortar and pestle. I have a gorgeous Italian marble and olive wood set that became more of an art object instead of tool.

One day, I walked past it and my old friend caught my eye.

Revelation 3 - No one is inventing any new produce or new proteins any time soon so I needed to come up with a way to make the everyday foods taste delicious again. I also need to make cooking fun for myself again.

When I am bored and can't think of staring down yet another pile of broccoli or green beans, I look to one of my favorite herb green sauces to enliven and lighten things up.

Raw and Green sauces are common around

the world. Think PESTO! Most cuisines have an herb-based sauce that is fresh, bright and versatile.

Raw and Green sauces present endless possibilities. By adding citrus juices, chilies, pickled capers or anchovies, the character of fresh herbs changes and the sauce becomes exciting, vibrant and alive. You can quickly travel the world (at dinner time) by making different sauces and serving them over your favorite foods.

Drizzling a raw and green sauce over cooked vegetables, or pouring one over chicken, beef or fish adds bright-punchy flavors. Marinating food in green sauces invigorates flavors and



makes dinner exciting, again.

Food processor versus Mortar and Pestle

While these sauces can be made easily in a blender or food processor, I prefer to make them by hand in a mortar and pestle.

There is something very personal and romantic when you make food by hand. It is very satisfying to crush spices and leaves by hand. You can smell and taste as you go. Simply dropping ingredients into a machine, while efficient, is impersonal and causes you to lose touch with your food.

A food processor tears and shreds ingredients which can result in oily and broken sauces. A mortar and pestle crushes the individual cells of herbs and spices which results in a creamy textured sauce. Think of creamy pesto versus oily pesto! Every sauce made in a mortar and pestle will be brightly flavored and emerald green. Sauces made in a food processor are dull flavored and often the color is equally dull.

Chimichurri

I think this is the sauce most people think of as a go-to Green Herb sauce. Chimichurri is as common as ketchup in Argentina. Tangyherby and with a punch of heat, this sauce is

perfect over steaks and vegetables. But don't stop there. Chimichurri is a great marinade and perfect for fish and grilled vegetables. Tossed with warm rice or pasta, chimichurri takes plain and simple and turns it into a

1/2 cup minced yellow onion

1/2 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves

1 tablespoon chopped fresh oregano

1 teaspoon finely grated or minced garlic

11/2 teaspoons sea salt

1 teaspoon freshly ground black

реррег

1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes

1 cup extra-virgin olive oil

1/2 cup red wine vinegar

- 1. Pulse or crush onion, parsley, garlic, pepper, pepper flakes, evoo and vinegar until a loose paste forms.
- 2. Store, covered, in the fridge for up to 5 days.
