

Purim: A Holiday of Merriment, *Menschlichkeit* and Meaning By Rabbi Michael Schwab



Purim is coming! And with it comes the prospect of a day of merriment and frivolity, costumes and candy, graggers and games. The joyous nature of Purim is apparent in almost every element of the holiday. The Purim story is both intriguing and humorous, free of technical or legal elements. Religious services are held in a

very distinctive and festive manner. Instead of coming to synagogue in our suits and dresses, we come to synagogue in colorful costumes! These costumes bring smiles to the faces of all and give the day a spirited mystery as we attempt to figure out who is who. The costumes alone help create an atmosphere of joy and lightheartedness which distinguishes Purim from other days.

However there is more! Instead of simply listening quietly to the reading of the *megillah*, we pay careful attention to the words so that when we hear "Haman" read aloud, we can all spin our noisy graggers to drown out any mention of his name. At those moments the synagogue is transformed from a quiet sanctuary to a spirited gathering place, allowing each member to participate in the ritual regardless of one's individual level of Jewish knowledge.

Further, it is a tradition to throw a Purim party, or *seudah*, during which we feast and eat delicious *hamantaschen* while taking part in entertainment, carnivals and Purim *Spiels* (humorous parodies). It is a time when formal convention is temporarily dismissed and joy rules the day.

Let us not forget, however, that Purim is more than just fun and games. It also has a serious theological message. In fact, in some ways Purim is the holiday most relevant to contemporary Jews. As people living in a modern society we rarely, if ever, experience direct communication with God. Yet, the stories of the Torah are filled with conversations between God and our ancestral leaders as well as with descriptions of miracles of all kinds. Today, these accounts, while still meaningful and full of wisdom, can seem fantastic and foreign to us. In contrast, however, Megillat Esther does not mention God's name once. Significantly though, the rabbis still chose to include it in the Hebrew Bible. Why? Mainly because they saw the message of the megillah as emphasizing that God's presence exists in our lives even when God is not clearly visible. The mere fact of this megillah's inclusion in our Tanakh makes clear the Jewish belief that even when God seems distant, we believe that God is always very close. What caused Achashverosh to wake in the middle of the night and recall Mordechai's service to him? What allowed Esther to risk her life and save the day? In our lives today, we also rarely experience a miraculous or direct encounter with God. Our challenge though is to sense the presence of God in the daily workings of the world, just as the rabbis sensed the Divine in the story of Purim.

Finally, never forget that on Purim while we celebrate and make merry, we must also remember to ensure that the larger community around us is able to be joyous as well. We must be *mensches* on Purim. Thus, it is customary to do two important things. One, on Purim we are to send *mishloach manot*, a gift of foods to several other community members. The idea is that by giving gifts you will include others in the joy of the day and bring them your festive spirit. Second, and possibly more important, is to give gifts to the poor. At Beth El we take a collection at both the evening and morning *Megillah* readings. Please give generously when you attend our services or find a way to make a donation to the poor on that day.

Therefore, to me, Purim is clearly a holiday that teaches us how to live life in general. We learn from our customs that we must celebrate with great joy whenever we can. Life is too short to not appreciate the goodness in the world. However, life is not frivolous and our responsibility to provide for everyone's happiness cannot be ignored. Happiness should be attainable for all people, no matter what their personal economic situation. Additionally, we must always keep in mind that God is eternally present, even while the Divine manifestation remains enigmatic.

So this Purim I encourage you all to participate as fully as you can in all of our Purim activities. Due to the fact that *continued on page 5*

The "March" from Purim to Passover

What if Purim and Passover weren't two separate holidays? What if they were bookends for a single monthlong process?

Rabbi David Hoffman of JTS taught me such. Notice that exactly one month separates the two holidays - Purim is on the 14th of Adar (15th in Jerusalem) while Passover is

celebrated on the 15th of Nisan.

The one-word summary of Purim is chaos. Life nearly ended for all the Jews, and then suddenly they were on top. Today Purim is marked by riotous, chaotic fun, costume, and shtick.

When we turn to Pesach, though, we encounter the opposite. In one word, Passover is about order. The holiday is dominated by the Seder, the step-by-step dinner script whose Hebrew word means "order." We follow time-tested processes and rules on Seder night to move us to a place where we taste slavery and freedom, literally and metaphorically.

The days that move us from Purim to Passover are themselves a step-by-step personal journey from chaos to order. How appropriate is it that this march happens during March? People can't turn from one strong emotion to another on a dime. We need time and a step-by-step process. And as the days of Passover draw nearer, we have the opportunity to prepare ourselves for the next stage of the year.

Let us enjoy these two upcoming holidays - and let us find meaning in seeing them as fundamentally connected too.

Ritual "Devash: Because Learning Torah is Sweet!"

You may have noticed a sweet addition to Beth El over the past few years. Every Shabbat (and some holidays, too), we display a very special parashah magazine, called Devash (honey), on a table outside of the sanctuary. There are multiple copies for people to look at while they are at shul, and many congregants take it home each week, as each weekly edition is

chock full of sweet Torah learning!

You may have seen these Devashim and thought, "That looks like it's for kids and families." And while that is partially correct as that was the original target audience, Hadar, the institution who created Devash, describes their educational goal in each edition: "By engaging directly with texts and taking kids seriously as Jews, Devash helps children (ages 7+) and grownups discover the weekly Torah portion."

Did you notice the "and grown-ups" description? It is so true, as the content of each Devash is filled with so many doors into the parashah for people of all ages, for people at all levels of Jewish learning.

Each *Devash* includes many if not all of the following sections:

- 1. Ma baParasha: a summary of the weekly Torah portion
- 2. *Midrash* and/or *Parshanut:* interpretations by a wide variety of commentators on the Torah verses
- 3. Halakhah: explanations of how aspects of the parashah apply to practical Jewish living

- 4. Daka shel Diyun: One-Minute Debates based on a value found in the parashah
- 5. Sh'eilot HaShavua: literally questions of the week, a parashah scavenger hunt (including an answer key if you need a little help!)
- 6. *Dikduk:* a Hebrew grammar moment, teaching about something unique in biblical Hebrew found in the Torah portion
- 7. *Rega shel lvrit:* a moment of Hebrew showing connections between biblical and modern versions of the language
- 8. Tefillah: Prayer in the Parashah, a connection showing the biblical root of various prayers we daven from our siddur

While we read the same Torah every year, each year of *Devash* has shared new content, commentaries and insights with each cycle. The learning possibilities for all ages are seemingly endless with Devash.



I encourage you to take a copy for yourselves to study and learn with your family and friends! I often have a few leftovers, and you can also access them online at https://hadar.org/ torah-tefillah/devash.

The opportunities for Torah learning in each weekly edition of Devash are nearly endless, providing us with sweet spiritual sustenance, like honey!



Inclusion is such a beautiful part of Jewish education and our efforts at Beth El to be the most inclusive place possible have been significant. However, we always have more to do to see each and every person in our community as integral and essential and to continue to adjust our communal atmosphere to invite all in.

Jewish Disabilities Awareness, Acceptance, and Inclusion Month (JDAIM) is a unified effort among Jewish organizations worldwide to raise awareness and foster inclusion of people with disabilities and those who love them. JDAAIM is observed each February. But the truth is, while it brings the issues of disability inclusion to the forefront, inclusion is something that we must keep focused on all year long.

In our quest to include every member of our community, we learn from ancient examples of accommodation from the beginning of the Torah where we are told that all humans are created in God's image to the story of Moses where his brother Aaron acts as a supportive interpreter. Every major holiday includes bringing diverse types together (think the lulav and etrog on Sukkot or the four children at Pesach) and our continual efforts are guided by these and other examples as we strive to continue to open our synagogue communal tent.



Our Gertrude Lederman Family Continuing Education Department is currently offering an introduction to American Sign Language for "Shul", taught by Jack and Mildred Cohen Religious School teacher, Sari Daybook. Sari is guiding our class

with knowledge and understanding about the deaf culture and exposure to basic ASL sign language. In addition to the basics, her focus will be on Jewish communal phrases about holidays and *smachot* so that we can better welcome members of the deaf community to Beth El and learn a selection of Hebrew prayers and blessings in ASL.



ne of the programs CRS 6th Graders participate in is called My Family Story. This curriculum from ANU: The Museum of the Jewish People (located in Tel Aviv), invites students to research their family story and create an artistic representation of their heritage. This project not only tells the story of the students' personal family projects, but also tells the unique and ongoing story of the Jewish people.

As part of their family story research, the students are asked to interview family members. What is their Jewish story? How does their personal story fit into the larger story of the Jewish people? This year, in preparation, students interviewed nine Beth El members. We are grateful to the following congregants for spending a Sunday morning with us. Thank you to: Jane Pickus, Bob Ruderman, Larry Pachter, Judy Weiss, David Weiss, Eli Krumbein, David Shapiro, Deborah Aizenberg and Sulie Holt. Congregants came armed with artifacts. Among them: a tallis katan, a photo with David Ben Gurion, a book from Stashov, Poland listing Jewish families from that village, most of whom were massacred by the Nazi's, entry papers to the United States, and of course, loads of family photos and other ritual objects.

It was an incredible morning of students hearing congregants' stories, asking questions, and thinking about their family interviews and what they might discover. Some impressions from the congregants were: "It was great to help launch the next generation." "I was surprised how touched I was personally to share my family story with the students." "Great program and the ending activity was fabulous to pull it all together for both the adults and the kids. Thanks for including me. Happy to come again next year!" The students were polite, mature and engaged. This intergenerational exchange between our 6th grade CRS students and congregants proved a meaningful experience for everyone involved. We can't wait for our Vav class to showcase their Family Story projects on Sunday, March 3rd.

Celebrating a Remarkable Jewish Educator

Erica cherishes her memories of her own four children's (Lorelai (16), Reese (14), Adley (10), and Tobey (9)) experiences being in the Steinberg Preschool and that's what inspired her to accept a role as a teacher where she has taught for the past 10 years. 
How Jewish Books Are Being "Bombed"

The Boy with the Star Tattoo by Talia Carner, published by HarperCollins in January, is one of the latest victims of "review-bombing," a vicious, and sometimes viral, attempt to tank a

book's rating on Goodreads, the popular platform that millions of readers use to share ratings and reviews of their favorite books. Why is this novel by an award winning author being "bombed"? Well, the dual narrative tells the story of two little known historical events in France: the rescue of hidden Jewish orphans after World War II by the Youth Aliya movement and the daring escape of French boats, commissioned and paid for by Israel, that were blocked by a French arms embargo in 1969. Numerous

by a French arms embargo in 1969. Numerous 1-star reviews on GoodReads claim that the book is "Zionist propaganda," "trash," and "based on sheer lies." Carner, a native Israeli who writes in English, reported the reviews as hate speech but they remain on the site. And while many readers have flagged the most egregious of these "reviews,"



hundreds of others have also responded by posting positive and supportive comments. As Talia wrote on my Facebook page, "it means so much to me when, at such a difficult time — when I'm already pained over the war in Israel and worry for the hostages — you and others are extending their warmth and support!" So much feels out of our control right now but this is one way I feel like I can help make a small difference in this little corner of the internet. I encourage you to check out *The Boy with the Star Tattoo* from our Abbell

Library, as well as Carner's previous novels, *The Third Daughter* (a past selection of the Sisterhood Torah Fund Book Club), *Hotel Moscow*, and *Jerusalem Maiden*.





From the Archives: Beth El's Historic Bond with Israel

Since the founding of the State of Israel, and even before, North Suburban Synagogue Beth El, its members and clergy, have maintained a close relationship with the Jewish State. Beth El was formally organized in August 1946 and its key founder, Benjamin Harris, was an ardent Zionist. For many years Harris worked nationally to help create an independent state in the Jewish homeland, and he and his wife Gertrude frequently opened their home in Glencoe to representatives of Israel on their visits to Chicago, including Abba Eban, Teddy Kollek and Golda Meir.

Israel Bonds, founded in 1951 by David Ben-Gurion, and Beth El have partnered consistently to raise funds for the purchase of Bonds. The investments in Bonds helped the State build Israel's infrastructure and institutions, and Israel has never defaulted on its obligation to repay those investments. For many years. the synagogue hosted an annual Israel Bond function, often honoring a distinguished member of the congregation or hosting a prominent speaker. One of the first such events was held at the synagogue in April 1959, when Abba Eban, then Israel's ambassador to the United Nations and the United States, was the speaker. Among the many honorees at the synagogue's Bond functions were Sol Shapiro and Isadore Finkelstein, Cantor Jordan and Marcia Cohen, Rabbi Mordecai and Maxine Simon, Irving and Janet Robbin, Robert and Yadel Sklare, Cantor Reuven and Penina Frankel, and the Beth El Sisterhood. And among the many stalwart advocates for Bonds within the congregation were Amos Turner, Howard Kaplan, Merle Mattenson, Philip Glass, Larry Block, Harold Gorin and Sam Rade.

Shortly after the Suez Canal Crisis in October 1956, the Beth El board of directors faced a dilemma: should the synagogue encourage its members to participate in an Israel Bond event featuring Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt but being held at North Shore Congregation Israel in Glencoe? After much debate, the board reached a decision: it referred the matter to a committee. Of course, many congregants from Beth El attended that function and invested in Bonds.

In addition to regular Bond functions, Beth El held special gatherings of the congregation following times of great distress in Israel. In June 1967, the Six Day War prompted

President Ben Sager to convene an emergency meeting of the congregation to offer prayers and to demonstrate the synagogue's support for Israel. At an Israel Bond dinner held soon afterward honoring Rabbi Philip and Shoshanah Lipis, \$150,000 (equivalent to over \$1,300,000 in 2024 dollars) was raised for Bonds. Again in 1973, following the Yom Kippur War, and also in 1991, during the Persian Gulf War, funds for Israel Bonds as well as for JUF's Israel Emergency Fund were raised in record amounts, demonstrating the special place Israel was held in the hearts of Beth El's members. Perhaps most significantly, beginning in 1971, the synagogue itself, following a vote of the members of the congregation, borrowed two million dollars to purchase Israel Bonds, using the synagogue's property as collateral for the loans. This continued until 1995 when Israel no longer offered bonds of that type.


Beth El's clergy has a long history of close ties to Israel. The synagogue's first rabbi, Maurice Kliers, was born in Safad, then in British Mandate Palestine. Rabbi Lipis, a fervent Zionist, had studied in Jerusalem during the Arab riots of 1929 and spent considerable time in Israel both during his 1967 sabbatical and following his retirement from Beth El in 1969. (It was Rabbi Lipis who ordered that the 1952 dedication of the school building be inscribed on Jerusalem stone shipped from Israel; the stone plaque remains visible in the school hallway.) Rabbi Lebeau was instrumental in Beth El's approval in 1985 of the SKIP program (Send a Kid to Israel Partnership) in cooperation with the Jewish Federation of Chicago. Rabbi Kurtz, who made aliyah to Israel following his retirement from Beth El in 2019, was involved with numerous organizations supporting Israel and, along with Alan Silberman, served for many years on the Board of Governors of the Jewish Agency. And of course, Rabbi Schwab is a strong advocate for Israel and has made numerous trips there, many as the leader of congregational missions.

Following the gruesome attack on Israel by Hamas terrorists on October 7, 2023, the congregation once again gathered to mourn the losses suffered and to show support for Israel. It also commenced a drive which raised over \$200,000 for the purchase of ambulances for Israel's Magen David Adom. And in the tradition of the synagogue, Beth El will again hold a special event to support Israel. On April 7, 2024, the congregation will have the opportunity to maintain its decades long relationship with Israel by participating in an Israeli themed evening by purchasing an Israel Bond. The almost eighty-year history of the bond between Beth El and the State of Israel is one of the outstanding characteristics of Beth El and one in which every member of the congregation can take special pride.

Forbidden Foods

The following foods are forbidden to Ashkenazic Jews during Pesach: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits and crackers; cereals, coffee substitutes derived from cereals; wheat, barley, oats, rice, dry peas, dry beans, and all liquids which contain ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. (Sephardic Jews have some different practices.)

Permitted Foods

Requiring no kosher l'Pesach label, the following foods are permitted in unopened packages or containers: natural coffee, sugar, tea, salt, pepper, and fresh vegetables (except peas and beans, although string beans are permitted on Pesach).

The following foods are permitted if certified for Pesach use by Rabbinical authority (have a kosher l'Pesach label): matzah, matzah flour, Passover noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, milk, butter, jams, cheese, jellies, relishes, dried fruits and vegetables, salad oils, vegetable gelatin, shortening, vinegar. Wines and liquors are permitted if certified by a Rabbinical authority as fit for Pesach use.

Dishes and Utensils

Only dishes and utensils specially reserved for Pesach should be used with the following exceptions: silverware made entirely of metal if used during the year may be used on Pesach if thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. Metal pots and pans used for cooking purposes only (but not for baking), if made wholly of metal, though used during the year, may be used on Pesach. They must first be thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. The utensils should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between their cleaning and immersion in boiling water.

Utensils used for baking during the year cannot be used for Passover. Earthenware, enamelware and porcelain utensils used during the year may not be used. Fine translucent chinaware if not used for a year is permitted if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

Authorities disagree as to the method of kashering drinking glasses. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach or putting them through a dishwasher. A dishwashing machine may be used for Passover after a thorough scouring, non-use for 24 hours and running a complete cycle. Authorities disagree whether a new tray is necessary.

The stove is prepared by a thorough scrubbing and cleansing of all parts, then turning on the ovens and all burners full-flame for one half hour. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned, then put through the self-cleaning cycle. Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens. Microwave ovens should be cleaned, and then a cup of water placed inside. The oven should be turned on until the water disappears.

A microwave that has a browning element cannot be kashered. In all the above cases the appliance cannot be used for 24 hours prior to kashering.

If the parts of electrical appliances that come into contact with Hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way. If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered.

Non-Passover dishes, pots and Hametz whose ownership has been transferred should be separated, locked up or covered and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Bedikat Hametz (The Search for and Burning of Leaven)

On the evening of Sunday, April 21st, the Search for Leaven, Bedikat Hametz, is conducted. This is a ritual that symbolizes the final cleaning of the house of all Hametz. It is customary to place pieces of bread in various rooms around the house before the search begins – remember how many pieces there are and where they are hidden! The search is conducted with a candle for light and a feather and wooden spoon to collect the Hametz. The Hametz, feather and wooden spoon should be put in a bag and set aside to be burnt in the morning.

In the morning – this year on Monday, April 22nd – after eating our last meal of Hametz, add any remains from breakfast to the bag of Hametz from the previous night, and burn them outside the home. This is the final act of removal of Hametz from our homes. Hametz should be burned by 11:41 am. The appropriate prayers for the search for and destruction of Chametz are found at the beginning of every Haggadah.

Mechirat Hametz (Sale of Hametz)

In addition to the thorough cleaning of the house before Pesach, we are



commanded to completely free ourselves of leavened products. Anything made from wheat, barley, oats, rye or spelt, which had a chance to leaven (rise or ferment), must be destroyed. Today a simple but meaningful tradition is followed:

- Each Jewish home must be cleaned before Pesach.
- The Rabbi contractually arranges for the sale of the Hametz to a non-Jew so that it will, technically, be out of Jewish possession during Pesach.
- At the end of Pesach, everything in your stored-up area will be repurchased for your immediate use.

Please see Hazzan Jenna Greenberg or use the QR code on the form on page 17 to sell your Hametz. Please contact her no later than Sunday, April 21st at 9:00pm. A voluntary contribution should be made upon selling Hametz. All gifts will be added to our Maot Chitim fund.

Maot Chitim (Portions of Wheat)

It is traditional for Jews who have been blessed by the Almighty to make sure that their less fortunate brethren have all that is necessary to celebrate a joyous Pesach. Special funds for this purpose, known as Maot Chitim, are collected in synagogues throughout the world. Beth El participates in this activity. If you would like to make a contribution to the Maot Chitim fund, please mail it directly to the synagogue, or bring it in personally, and earmark it accordingly. These funds will be distributed to the Greater Chicago Maot Chitim and other institutions that provide Pesach food to the less fortunate.

Siyyum Bechorim (Fast of the Firstborn)

The ceremony of Siyyum Bechorim will take place following the morning minyan on Monday, April 22nd at 7:00am. It is customary for the first-born male to fast on the day preceding Passover. In place of the fast, however, tradition developed the practice of concluding a portion of study of a Rabbinic text after which celebration and feasting takes place. The Siyyum Bechorim ceremony is the means of obviating the need for a fast. We encourage all first-born males to attend.
