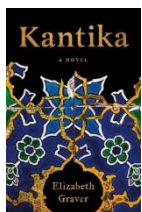


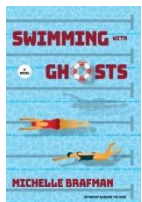

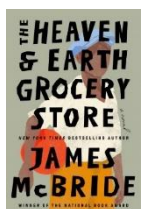
A dazzling Sephardic multigenerational saga that moves from Istanbul to Barcelona, Havana, and New York, exploring displacement, endurance, and family as home.

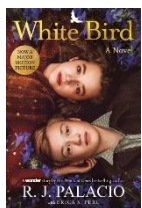

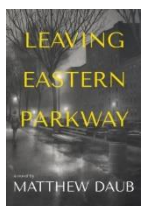

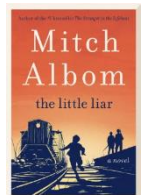


Leaving Eastern Parkway by Matthew Daub

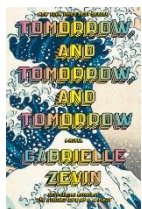
